His condition is regarded as serious.

WANT REDUCTION IN COAL RATES

Indiana Coal Mining Officials Say Present Rates Are Discriminatory

Indianapolis, Ind., April 23—(United Press)—A further reduction in freight rates on coal was sought today by Indiana mining officials in a conference with the state public service commission.

Through a cut in the freight rates the operators and miners hope to revive the coal mining industry of the state from the slump of the past few months.

It is contended that present rates are discriminatory against Indiana mines and that coal from the non-union fields of Kentucky and West Virginia can underbid the product of Indiana mines in their home territory.

The delegation will ask a reduction sufficient to enable the Indiana industry to compete with other fields. John McCardie, chairman of the public service commission, said Phil Penna, of Terre Haute, representing the operators, Albert Dally, state mining inspector, and officials of district 11, United Mine Workers, were expected at the conference.

Frederick attacked the tariff from the farmer's standpoint, declaring it never had and never would aid the farmer because he produces exportable surpluses.
