LONDON AWAKES TO FACE CRISIS

City Is Helpless As Strike Goes Into Effect At Midnight

London, May 4.—The largest city in the world awoke this morning to find itself as helpless as any little roadside hamlet.

Confident yesterday that there would be an eleventh-hour settlement of the strike, London seemed today to find its transportation facilities at a standstill. Starting at 4 and 5 a. m., workers of all ages and walks of life began trudging toward their daily tasks in the city.

At six a. m., a United Press correspondent chartering one of the few automobiles in the streets, toured the circle bordered by the great railway terminals of King's Cross, Liverpool street, Victoria and Waterloo stations. Regardless of whether the strike continues, it has started with complete effectiveness.

Stragglers were afoot for the most part, but bicycles, motorcycles and all manner of wagons and carts passed by in fantastic procession. One old woman, without strength to walk any distance, was wheeled by her son in a baby carriage.

The automobile is not the vehicle of the office man or working man here. It is only the wealthy, rolling to work in their cars, can scorn the affects of a general strike.

Boy Scouts May Mobilize 4 At Belmont Park, July 4

If present plans do not miscarry indications point to a mobilization of between six and eight hundred Boy Scouts from eastern Indiana and western Ohio in attendance to the big 4th of July celebration which will be held at Belmont Park, this city, Monday, July 5th.

The Scouts will go through their many drills, first aid, police duty, athletics, and so forth and invitations will be extended to all the cities surrounding Decatur, including Van Wert, Delphos, Lima, Greenville, Wapakoneta, Celina, St. Marys, Ohio, and Fort Wayne, Bluffton, Huntington, Portland, Kendallville, Auburn, Hartford City and other towns in Indiana.

An extensive advertising campaign is now being planned and the celebration will be advertised to over a million people surrounding Decatur. Excursion rates will be offered on all railroads and interurbans.

Scientist Is Honored

Emory University, Ga., May 4 — (United Press)—Dr. W. A. Shelton, professor of Semitic languages at Emory university, has been elected to membership in the Royal Geographic Society of Great Britain.

Dr. Shelton was one of the American scientific mission sent out by the University of Chicago in 1919, which made an extensive survey of the archaeological fields of Egypt, Assyria and Babylonia.
