EBB-VALE MINE AT SULLIVAN IS RUINED BY FIRE

ed from the Terre Haute fire department to the scene of the fire.

The Ebb-Vale mine, whose headquarters is in Terre Haute is the largest mine in the Sullivan field employing 450 men and producing an output of 2,300 tons of coal daily.

A short circuit in a motor battery is believed to have started the fire which spread quickly to the oil-soaked timbers of the shaft.

An estimate of the tremendous damage is impossible at this time. Henry Smith, president of the mine would place no estimate on the loss today. The coal in the sealed mine will probably smoulder for weeks, it was said.

information of interest to every business man in Indiana.

Taxpayers will be interested in the report of the Auditor of State who handles all state funds.

The net volume of business handled by this department is approximately \$35,000,000 annually.

Disbursement of state funds is handled through a budget system which is explained in the report of the department.

The budget system was put into operation in 1923 after having been approved by the state legislature in 1921. Its purposes, as outlined by the report, are to secure better government at less cost, to exercise control in time to prevent abuse and to prevent funds from being diverted from their intended use.

The budget, according to the report, assures careful, understandable, responsible planning; exercises control over the state's purse; enables the legislature to consider and act on a definite financial program, and substitutes facts instead of guesses as a basis for fixing amounts to be appropriated.

The budget operates by showing expenditures, appropriations, and estimates so classified and summarized that they may be readily understood. It recognizes past experiences as the most dependable indicator, or basis, in formulating estimates for the future.

Other reports of exceptional interest in the 1925 year book include that of the Department of Conservation which contains sub-reports of the forestry, lands and water, fish and game, entomology, geology and engineering divisions.

This report is of especial interest to farmers and sportsmen of the state inasmuch as it outlines agricultural developments, accomplishments in the preservation of fish and game, progress of the state parks program and many other points of general interest.

The reports of the tax board, public service commission, banking department, department of public instruction, state highway commission, state board of health and the industrial board all contain much of interest to citizens of Indiana.

RAIDS PUTS STOP TO REVOLT PLAN

Right Wing Extremists Are Caught in Berlin As They Plan Revolt

Berlin, May 12.—(United Press)—In a formal communique today, the chief of police of Berlin declared that raids on the premises of the right wing extremists had disclosed preparations for a political coup which included an armed attack on Berlin.

It was described as the gravest threat against the German republic since the famous "Kapp Putsch" which failed.

The police maintained they found documents and other evidence to prove ultra-nationalist plotters planned to make President Von Hindenburg dictator after securing his resignation from the presidency; to abolish the Dawes plan; scrap and Locarno treaty; repudiate the Versailles treaty and revive militarism.

A cabinet crisis has developed as a result of the decision of the democratic party to submit two motions to the Reichstag today endorsing President Von Hindenburg's demand for a uniform national flag and refusing confidence in Chancellor Luther's policy of maintaining the old imperial colors.

The foreign office told the United Press, however, that "the report that Chancellor Luther or the cabinet has resigned is premature."

The cabinet met and adjourned this morning without deciding on the question of resignation. It is expected that should the cabinet resign, Foreign Minister Stresemann would head the new government.
