information of interest to every busi- ness man in Indiana.

Taxpayers will be interested in the report of the Auditor of State who handles all state funds.

The net volume of business handled by this department is approximately \$35,000,000 annually.

Disbursement of state funds is handled through a budget system which is explained in the report of the department.

The budget system was put into operation in 1923 after having been approved by the state legislature in 1921. Its purposes, as outlined by the report, are to secure better government at less cost, to exercise control in time to prevent abuse and to prevent funds from being diverted from their intended use.

The budget, according to the report, assures careful, understandable, responsible planning; exercises control over the state's purse; enables the legislature to consider and act on a basis for fixing amounts to be appropriated.

The budget operates by showing expenditures, appropriations, and estimates so classified and summarized that they may be readily understood. It recognizes past experiences as the most dependable indicator, or basis, in formulating estimates for the future.

Other reports of exceptional interest in the 1925 year book include that of the Department of Conservation which contains sub-reports of the forestry, lands and water, fish and game, entomology, geology and engineering divisions.

This report is of especial interest to farmers and sportsmen of the state inasmuch as it outlines agricultural developments, accomplishments in the preservation of fish and game, progress of the state parks program and many other points of general interest.

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The reports of the tax board, public service commission, banking department, department of public instruction, state highway commission, state board of health and the industrial board all contain much of interest to citizens of Indiana.

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
