"POSSESSION" CLAUSE HELD UNCONSTITUTIONAL

The act became effective.

The court held Guertling had plenty of time to dispose of the liquor.

In 1923, the supreme court held unconstitutional the "possession" clause of the prohibition law, then in effect, because the title of the act was faulty.

From that time until the Wright law, passed by the legislature in 1925, became effective, the possession of small quantities of intoxicating liquor was not, in itself, punishable under the state laws.

Guertling's appeal was taken from a sentence of 60 days on the state penal farm and a fine of \$200 and costs.

Nine Persons Killed In Indiana Over Holiday

Indianapolis, Ind., June 1.—(United Press)—Nine persons were dead from violent causes in Indiana today and twenty-one others were injured, several seriously, as a result of holiday auto accidents.

Three were killed by lightning during a violent wind and thunderstorm that swept the state late Monday.

Four died in auto crashes, one man accidentally shot himself while cleaning a revolver and a boy was killed in attempting to hop a freight train.

FATAL ACCIDENT IS DESCRIBED

(CONTINUED FROM PAGE ONE)
Decatur.

The Hillsdale, Michigan, Daily News gives the following account of the accident in a special dispatch from Jonesville:

"Jonesville, May 29.—One man Sylvester F. Campbell, was killed and two others, Anthony Angeline and Glenn Crandall, were severely injured at about ten-thirty this morning while working for the Jonesville Gravel company.

"The three men, all employees of the Gravel company, were working on a gravel car spotting it by hand about an eighth of a mile south of the pit. The men were pushing the car to the north when the Jonesville Switch engine which was rushing some other cars from the north backed into the car the men were spotting.

"Instead of the cars coupling the one rebounded and ran over the workers. The three men who were trying to get the car in a position where it could be loaded did not know that the switch men could not see the men who were behind the car.

"E. G. Willimen, manager of the Gravel Plant ordered ambulances to be sent for from both Hillsdale and Jonesville and he took the two men who were hurt the least and rushed them to the Hillsdale hospital in his sedan. Miner's ambulance arrived a few minutes after-ward and Mr. Campbell was taken to the Hillsdale hospital, where he was cared for by Dr. W. H. Sawyer of Hillsdale and Dr. Fisk of Jonesville. Everything possible was done to save Mr. Campbell's life but he died about forty-five minutes after he had been brought to the hospital.

"Both legs and one arm were severed from Mr. Campbell's body and there were terrible body bruises. Mr. Angeline's foot was crushed but it has not been determined whether or not there are any broken bones in the foot. It is believed that one of Mr. Crandall's ribs is broken and there are severe bruises. Neither Mr. Angeline nor Mr. Crandall are dangerously hurt.

"None of the men had worked at the pit for any length of time. Mr. Campbell had been employed there for about eight or ten weeks and Mr. Crandall had worked there for about the same length of time. Mr. Angeline had only worked there about four weeks and has only lived in this vicinity for that length of time, having come from Toledo.

Born in Indiana
Mr. Campbell was born May 9,

1878, in Adams county, Indiana. The family came to Hillsdale two and one-half years ago from Ohio and made their home on East Bacon street about two and one-half miles west of Hillsdale.

"Surviving his death are the wife, Mrs. Julia E. Campbell; five children, Mrs. Morris Mumma, of Decatur, Ind.; Theodore, of Fort Wayne; Dwight of Hillsdale, and Hoyt and Darce at home; his mother, Mrs. Clara Campbell of Elkhart, Ind., and two brothers, True Campbell, of Chicago, and Milo Campbell, of Elkhart, Ind."

Arnold Will Probated

The last will of William Arnold, prominent Kirkland township farmer who was killed by lightning recently, has been probated in court here. It provides that \$500 be given to the widows, Sadie Arnold, in addition to one-third of the balance of the personal property and one-third of the real estate. The rest of the personal property and the real estate is to be divided among the six children.

Homer W. Arnold and Mary Arnold each getting one-sixth and Elsie A. Vernon L. Glen and Kenneth W. each getting one-twelfth. The will was written May 27, 1920. As Judge Jesse C. Sutton was a witness to the will, he declined jurisdiction in the case and appointed Attorney Henry B. Heller to act as special judge.

Homer W. and Vernon Arnold were appointed executors and they filed bond in the sum of \$10,000.
