GENTRY SEEKS AN EARLY TRIAL

Aide To D. C. Stephenson Wants To Be Tried On Arson Charge Soon

Indianapolis, June 4—(United Press)

—Earl Gentry, former deputy sheriff and aide to D. C. Stephenson, former Klan leader now serving a life sentence in the state prison for the murder of Madge Oberholzer, has asked an early trial on the indictment, charging him and Earl Klink with conspiracy to commit arson.

In placing his plea before Prosecutor William H. Remy and Judge James A. Collins, Gentry stated that he had been unable to find employment since his acquittal on a charge of murder with Stephenson.

Being out of a job he found it difficult to pay the interest of the \$5,000 bond under which he is at liberty. The court said it would make a final finding on July 5.
