### Purdue Man Spends Wednesday In County

P. T. Brown, of the Animal Husbandry Department at Purdue university, spent Tuesday in Adams county in the interest of the Hoosier Ton Litter club and Hoosier Gold Medal Colt club. Mr. Brown is in charge of both projects, in which many farmers throughout the state are enlisted.

During the forenoon, a visit was paid to Joseph P. Habegger, of Monroe township, where some prospective ton litters were inspected. Mr. Habegger is feeding three litters, consisting, respectively, of eleven, ten and eleven pigs. The pigs are approximately one hundred days old and will weigh about one hundred pounds each. A colt entered in the Hoosier Gold medal Colt club was seen on the Harrison Miller farm. It appeared that Mr. Miller will likely be among the Gold Medal winners when the colt is weighed next fall. In the afternoon, Mr. Brown attended the Fanner Stock Sale.

today evening, although they were sore from bruises. Mrs. William Dells, of Grand Rapids, Michigan, left the hospital this morning.

### Right of Way Closed

Section crews worked all night on repairing the track. The track was repaired sufficiently to permit traffic to be resumed shortly before midnight last night, and the night passenger trains were not delayed. Several freight trains were held up for several hours, however. The trains were forced to proceed cautiously over the newly laid track, and their speed was limited to five miles per hour over that section.

The wrecked cars and locomotive were removed from the scene of the

wreck this morning. The locomotive and part of the cars were taken to Fort Wayne, and the other coaches were taken to Richmond for repairs.

It was estimated by officials of the company that the damage to the road's equipment was \$3,975. This does not include the track damage and other losses. It is thought that the total loss to the Pennsylvania company will be in excess of \$5,000, excluding the possible claims from the injured passengers.
