more be raised, so that necessary expenses in connecting with routing and marking the highway can be raised. Three-fourths of the state quota will be sent to national headquarters and one-fourth will remain in the state. A majority of the cities or counties along the route have raised their quotas and favorable comments are heard on the proposed route from all parts of the country.

The ultimate desire of the national committee is to have the national government take over the route and designate it as a federal route, making it one of the greatest highways in the country.

SUNDAY SCHOOLS IN STATE MEET

Three Thousand Delegates Gather At Richmond For State Convention

Richmond, Ind., June 16—(United Press)—Three thousand delegates from Sunday schools throughout the entire state registered today for the annual state Sunday school convention here.

Officials who have spent the past few months preparing for the convention say they are well pleased with the program which has been arranged and believe it is one of the most comprehensive ever drawn up in this state.

Incoming delegates started registration at 7:30 this morning and the entire early part of the morning was devoted to this work. Local registration was held yesterday afternoon in order to prevent possibility of a tie-up which might result from too many arriving this morning.

Following registration a mass session was held with President William Lowe Bryan presiding.

At the second session of the day which opened at 10 o'clock, the city of Richmond extended its welcome to the delegates and President Bryan delivered his message, officially opening the convention.

An address on "Christian Education and Christian Conduct" by W. S. Board and a bible message by Frank J. Ballard were also included in this morning's program.

W. C. Pearce, prominent Sunday school worker, was to speak at a banquet for county officers this evening and the program for tonight included three mass sessions, one for each children, young people and adults workers.

Sectional conferences and a banquet for young people's workers will feature the program for to-morrow morning President Bryan will address the delegates at the banquet.

A mass session at the Trueblood indoor field, Earlham college, with E. H. Hasemeir presiding, will be held tomorrow afternoon. An address—"Start and Standards"—by Margaret Slattery will be a feature of this session.
