## FEDERAL AID FOR ROAD IS FAVORED

### Government Likely To Give Aid To Two Strips Of Franklin Highway

Thus Federal aid for certain parts of the route of the Benjamin Franklin, coast-to-coast highway, through Ohio, is being favored, is shown in the following news story published by a Findlay, Ohio, newspaper yesterday.

Members of the Benjamin Franklin Highway Association of Ohio met yesterday with officials of the Ohio State highway Department at Columbus, and George F. Schlessinger, of the department, argued to recommend to the Federal Bureau of Good Roads at Washington that two strips of the highway in Ohio is placed on Federal Aid System.

The strips are from Ottawa to Van Wert, and Findlay to Tiffin, the only sections of the Benjamin Franklin route from Omaha, Neb., to Atlantic City, N. J., not on Federal Aid System. Mr. Schlessinger's recommendation to the Federal Bureau is expected to carry weight, and highway officials feel assured that the necessary aid will be received.

If Federal Aid is received, 50 per cent of costs of improvements will fall on the Federal Bureau, 35 per cent on the counties involved, and the remaining five per cent on the property owners.

Miss Frances Miller, Findlay secretary of the Benjamin Franklin highway Association of Ohio, resigned and Guy B. Murry, Nova, O., was elected to fill the vacancy.

Representing the Benjamin Franklin Highway Association from Ohio were John H. Williamson, national president, and W. E. Stephenson, a vice-president.
