Paving Work On State Highways Being Pushed

Indianapolis, Ind. June 29.—(United Press)—A temporary bridge is now in use on No. 3 (National Road) just east of Brazil eliminating a detour of several days, and a bridge run-around at a mile north of Crown Point on No. 8, one of the principal routes into Chicago, was removed this week. John D. Williams, state road director, reported in the commission's traffic bulletin issued today.

Report from field workers to the commission's offices show that paving contracts are being pushed and that maintenance forces are keeping the stone and gravel surface mileage in splendid shape to meet the increased demands of summer traffic. New pavement on No. 19 south of Veedersburg will be opened to traffic in a few days and another detour on this important trunk line between Evansville and Chicago will be removed, Williams said.

Movie Film Bootleggers Reported At Work In State

Indianapolis, Ind. June 29.—(United Press)—A bulletin, asking State fire inspectors and chiefs of City fire departments to be on the look-out for "movie film bootleggers," has been issued by the State Fire Marshall's office here.

According to the bulletin motion picture film is being systematically stolen from certain distributors and recent events indicate that much of the film is being peddled among small stationary, toy and general stores by the "bootleggers" to be resold to children for use in toy projectors.

The chiefs and inspectors were asked to report any findings to the State fire marshal so that the illegal traffic may be checked.

New Type Trade School To Open In Cleveland

Cleveland, Ohio, June 29.—(United Press)—A trade school, the first of its kind operated by a board of education, will be opened here next fall to function in conjunction with labor unions and employers, and with the cooperation of the Cleveland Board of Education.

The new trade school, the result of a conference between school authorities, the local chamber of commerce, employers and union leaders, was announced by Howard L. Briggs, director of vocational training of the board of education.

Courses in the building trades, auto mechanics and machinists' trades have already been outlined in the curriculum. Pupils will spend four hours a week in school, for which time they will be paid by their employers at the regular rate of pay, the remainder of

the time to be put in "on the job." Labor unions have agreed to accept diplomas of the school, and will receive graduates into full standing in the respective unions.

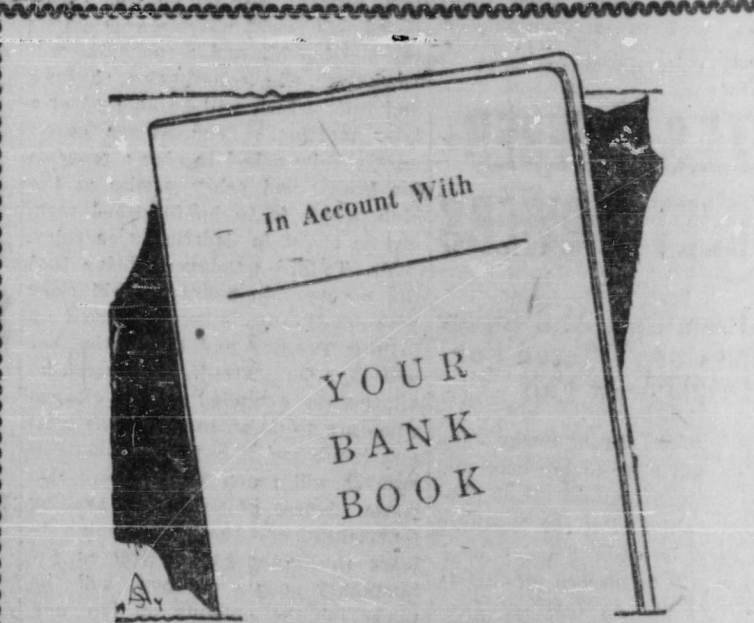
