Illinois Motor Buses Show Rapid Increase

Springfield, Ill., July 1.—(United Press)—Within twelve years eighty-eight motor bus companies have developed a motor bus system in Illinois with 800 busses, covering more than two thousand miles of hard road. It is announced by the Illinois Commerce Commission.

First certificates for motor bus companies were issued in 1914, and up to January 1, 1925, eighteen certificates had been issued. The number issued up to January 1, 1926, was 192. Six of these certificates were for freight lines, the remainder being for passenger busses.

Wimbledon, July 1.—Molla Mallory, former American women's tennis champion, was eliminated from one all-England championships today.

Miss D'Alvarez, the Spanish champion, defeated Mrs. Mallory 6-2, 6-2, for the privilege of meeting Mrs. L. A. Godfree in the final for the championship. King Alphonso and Queen Victoria of Spain saw their gifted subject defeat the Mrs. Mallory.

Wimbledon, Eng., July 1.—(United Press.)—Howard Kinsey and Vincent Richards today defeated R. Lycett and A. W. Austin in the men's doubles of the all-England championships, 7-5, 6-4, 6-4.

Berger and Mrs. Strawson will meet Kinsey and Richards in the quarter-finals which team shall enter the final.

have been ordered to make rapid progress in drying up these sources of bootleggers supplies.

Meantime the coast guard, under Andrews direction, has been shifting its Armadada to campaign against rum runners. A squadron of the destroyer fleet has been ordered on patrol duty between Virginia and Florida.

Andrews believes that he can break the liquor rings before November. By that time, home brew beverages will be a thing of the past, he said.

Andrews sails for Europe next week to negotiate anti-smuggling treaties with Great Britain, Germany, France, Denmark, The Netherlands, Spain and Italy.

Upon returning late in the month, he plans to call a convocation of administrators at Washington to map out the late summer and fall drive against liquor venders. He is still confident that the bill to reorganize the prohibition unit will squeeze through this session of congress and plans to counter with the dry lieutenants on the new program. After the conference Andrews plans to make a border inspection of the entire country and visit Alaska.

By fall he plans to have the dry organization functioning so diligently that the country will be well on the road to aridity.

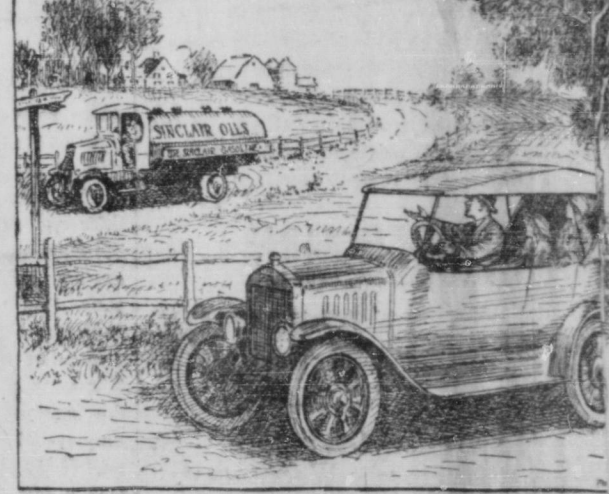
