names of those who died within the rippled hull.

Four physicians went down to the dry dock shortly after the first body was received to assist in removing those remaining.

J. H. Taylor, of the naval identification bureau in Washington was at the morgue. He said he hoped to identify the bodies by one or four methods:

1—By identification disks which

some of the men may have been wearing.

2—By markings on such clothing as may not have been decomposed.

3—By fingerprints.

4—By dental work and other peculiarities in the teeth.

Taylor had not seen the first body when he spoke to newsmen.

The bodies were brought to the hospital morgue in casket baskets covered with white canvas. The features of all were unrecognizable and it was not apparent whether the men were officers or enlisted men as their uniforms were faded and torn.

Captain E. J. King, of the New London, Conn., submarine base, after looking over the vessel as it appeared above the water, led a group of navy officers in arguing that responsibility for the disaster belonged to the City of Rome. He based his claim on three reasons:

1—The hole shows that the submarine was struck on the port side which proved, according to Captain King, that the submarine had the right of way.

2—The angle at which the submarine was struck showed it was turning away and that the commander of the S-51 realized the situation. The Rome, he said, should have been able to realize it also and also turn away.

3—The lights of the S-51 normally were visible at an angle of 22 1/2 degrees and the angle at which the submarine was struck indicated the lights should have been seen by the watch of the City of Rome giving sufficient warning.
