#### Livestock Market News

##### Service Is Established

Indianapolis, Ind., July 19.—(United Press)—A livestock market news service, similar to those maintained for the past several years at Chicago and other large market centers, was established today at the Indianapolis livestock market, by the United States Department of Agriculture.

The news service was established by the government at the local stock yards in recognition of the importance of Indianapolis and Indiana as a livestock market center.

The local news service will be conducted through an office of the Department of Agriculture's meat and wool division, under the direction of J. L. Mozley who has had several years of experience in the handling of livestock and meat products and in livestock market news.

The Indianapolis office was one of six new offices established by the news service division of the Department and will bring the total of livestock, wheat and wool markets reported by the Federal agency to 26.

In handling this service the Department of Agriculture maintains 7,000 miles of telegraph lines for the transmission of livestock news between markets.

The Federal service will be utilized by the United Press and other press associations, by the commercial telegraph stations, the agricultural market and metropolitan press and broadcasting stations.

#### Storm Kills Eight Persons

Boston, July 19.—(United Press)—Eight persons were dead today following a terrific electric storm which late yesterday swept portions of Maine, New Hampshire and Massachusetts.

At least a dozen others were more or less seriously injured and property damage estimated at upward of a million dollars resulted. Four of the victims were killed by lightning, one by a falling tree, and three were drowned.

The dead: Edward Snow of Hermon, Me., Marie A. Dubois of Adams, Leo McCaughey of Lawrence, Soturno Matani of Springfield, George Guilote of Springfield, and Adolphus Bruno of East Jeffrey, N. H.

Western Massachusetts was hardest hit by the storm, four persons losing their lives and more than \$500,000 damage being caused in that section.

**Kills Wife With Hammer; Conscience Hurts Him**

Syracuse, N. Y., July 19.—(United Press)—Killing his wife with a hammer, 51-year-old Acosting Izzo dressed her body in her best Sunday clothes placed it in a box and hired an express man to cart the corpse to a lonely spot on the shores of Lake Onondaga. There he dug a grave, and returned to tell his grown up family that their mother had gone to Detroit to visit an older son.

The crime was revealed when Izzo, conscience stricken, went to the home of a detective and confessed.

## BEET AREA IS 755,000 ACRES

### Colorado Leads All States In America In Sugar Beet Production

New York, July 19.—Some 755,000 acres of American land are occupied this year in growing sugar beets that will provide close to 2,000,000,000 pounds as a parva. satisfaction of the national sweet tooth during the coming twelve months, reports the national sugar trade journal, Facts About Sugar. This is enough to supply all the sugar required by the western half of the United States where most of the sugar beet crop is grown.

Colorado leads all the states of the Union in the production of beet sugar and probably will turn out close to 700,000,000 pounds during the coming season. Beet sugar in fact is the most important of all Colorado's crops; and it also is an important contributor to the agricultural wealth of other western states including Utah, Idaho, California, Montana, Wyoming, Nebraska and Kansas and of Minnesota, Iowa, Wisconsin, Michigan, Ohio and Indiana further east. The acreage planted to sugar beets in the various states this year is as follows:

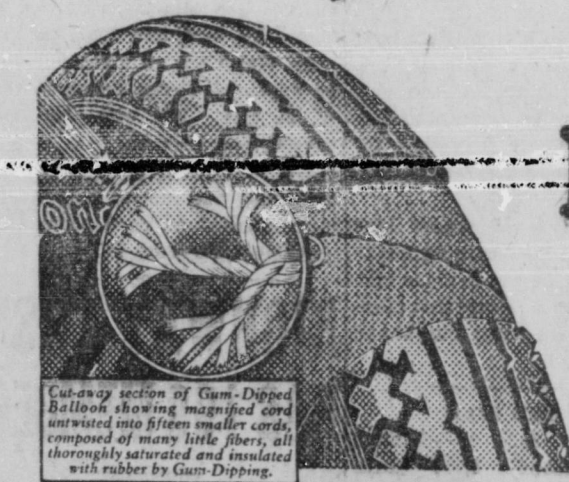
