Accidental Shooting Claims Life Of Child

Van Wert, Ohio, July 20.—Torrence Ansley, 11, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Ansley, residing three miles northeast of Paulding, Ohio, died at the Van Wert County Hospital, here, Sunday, as the result of being accidentally shot by another lad, named Bailey, of Latty, Ohio. The child died while being prepared for an emergency operation.

The tragedy occurred at the home of the child's grandfather, James T. Coldwater, Paulding county commissioner, where a family celebration of a birthday anniversary was being held. The children, finding a .22 calibre rifle, were playing with the gun, which they did not think was loaded. The order for patrol was issued by Charles F. Peterson of the Michigan Conservation Department.


