SHUMAKER ASKS FOR DISMISSAL

Motion To Dismiss Con- tempt Of Court Proceed- ings Filed With Court

Indianapolis, Ind., July 22.—(Unit-
ed Press.)—A motion to dismiss con-
tempt of court proceedings against
Dr. E. S. Shumaker, superintendent
of the Indiana Anti-Saloon League,
was on file today with the state su-
preme court.

At the same time the motion to
dismiss was filed, an answer was sub-
mitted to recommendations of a com-
mittee of "friends of the court," that
Dr. Shumaker be found guilty of con-
tempt.

The answer attacked the stand tak-
en by five of the six lawyers serving
as friends of the court and asserted
they were resorting to the obsolete
legal theory of "the king can do no
wrong."

It was also asserted that Shuma-
ker was not guilty of false statements
in his annual report criticizing dry
law decisions of the supreme court
and that to punish him for contempt
would deprive him of his rights of
free speech.

After Attorney General Gilliom has
filed an answer to the latest docu-
ment defending Shumaker it is ex-
pected that the supreme court will
meet in special session before the end
of the month to make final disposi-
tion of the case.

Shumaker has indicated that if
found guilty and sentenced for con-
tempt of court he will not personally
take an appeal.
