**New Test Developed**  
**For Plane Propellers**

### Marine Officer Walks In 10-Inch Lane Through Barrage To Train Men

Washington, July 24. — (United Press)—One of the bravest men in the world is Captain Victor Bleasdale, U. S. Marine Corps, who walks daily through heavy machine gun fire just to show troops the infallibility of machine guns.

Captain Bleasdale, a Blanc Mont veteran, walks through ten inch wide area, during a machine gun barrage. He takes his stroll calmly, confident that the bullets do not vary in course after they are discharged.

By this courageous method marine troops are shown how close they can walk to a machine gun barrage, in making a surprise flank attack on the enemy.

The secret of the trick, Captain Bleasdale said, is simple. All you do is walk in a straight line. One step to the right or left probably would mean instant death.

Another stunt of the officer is to walk between the machine gun fire and targets to illustrate there is a safe space where troops will be made, but own barrage fired overhead.

### British Grouse Season Shows Good Prospects

London. — (United Press). — Prospects for grouse shooting on the Cleveland moors are excellent for the coming season, opening August 12, according to reports here.

Dry weather has been very favorable to hatching and young grouse are already reported on the wing in some districts. Highland sporting preserves are being leased at high rentals. One 60,000 acre deer and grouse sanctuary, it is understood, has been rented for \$35,000 for the season.

Prospects for all game shooting in the favorite fields of North Yorkshire are good.

### Blind Of Edinburgh Ride Free On Trains

Edinburgh. — (United Press). — Edinburgh is proud of being the first city in the world to provide, in perpetuity, free rides on the street cars for all blind people.

It is a courtesy extended to all blind people whether rich or poor. On the outskirts are large workshops for the blind. The employees live all over Edinburgh and the remission of street car fares is said to save the individual something like \$30 a year.

### Forty Thousand Year Old Human Skull Is Unearthed At Gibraltar

London (United Press). — A human skull, said to be 40,000 years old, will be one of the principal exhibits before the meeting of the British Association, which opens at Oxford on August 4th. The skull was recently unearthed at Gibraltar by Miss D. A. E. Garrod during excavations there. It was found several feet underground. Numerous Neanderthal flint implements were found on the spot.

Discovery of the fragments will probably lead to the identification of another skull which was discovered in the vicinity in 1840 and which is believed to be a remnant of the Neanderthal race. The earlier skull is thought to have been that of a female and the recently discovered skull is expected to be accepted as proof that the race existed throughout Europe.

The race is said to be African in origin and that first date was found in Germany in 1850 when a skull was found in the Neanderthal Valley. Although these skulls have the raised eyebrow bones, similar to those found in skulls of apes, the race is accepted as human.

### MUCH ALFALA WILL BE SOWN

Doubtless influenced by the good crops of alfalfa they have seen harvested this year, quite a number of farmers are planning to sow a field for their own use this fall. According to the number of inquiries received almost daily at the county agent's office, especially those farmers who are milking cows, are beginning to realize that the great amount of talk about the good qualities of alfalfa is not all idle gossip. Dairy men are finding that their cows produce a larger flow of milk during the winter when fed alfalfa hay than when given any other roughage, except possibly soybean hay.

It is suggested that those who wish to seed alfalfa this summer should do so not later than August 15, and sooner if possible. The ground should be plowed, a fine seed bed prepared and thoroughly packed before seed is sown. No other crop should be sown with the alfalfa.

Alfalfa absolutely will perish if sown on sour soil. Since no farmer can determine without properly testing it, whether soil is sweet or sour he should have the ground tested before even planning to seed the alfalfa. Adequate equipment for testing soil to determine the need for limestone to correct acidity now is being used at the county agent's office and any one desiring this service is entitled to the same free of charge. Accordingly, those who contemplate starting an alfalfa field, should first take several pint samples of dirt from the field and have them tested by the county agent. It is a foolishness to invest in expensive seed if the ground is not sweet enough to grow the crop.

### Work Started On Annex To Capitol Building

Indianapolis, Ind., July 24. — (United Press). — Active work has started on the remodeling of the old Indiana University medical school building for use as an annex to the Capitol building.

Workmen have started removing the woodwork from the three story structure and will start on the removal of walls in a few days.

The State highway department, the board of health and several of the conservation departments will be housed in the old building.

### New Blood Test Device Counts Red Corpuscles

Washington, July 24. — (United Press). — Now comes the haemometer tester, which will tell you whether the number of red and white corpuscles in your blood has been correctly counted. The proportion of red and white corpuscles indicate the condition of the blood.

The tester is an instrument which has been installed in the U. S. surgeon general's department and it is displayed at the Sesquicentennial Exposition at Philadelphia as another evidence of Yankee invention.

The instrument utilizes the interference of light waves in its operation and according to the Bureau of Standards will insure accurate blood tests.

#### Grieving Mother Ends Life

Shelbyville, Ind., July 24. — (United Press). — Grieving over the death of her little son a year ago, Mrs. Dilhard Huber took poison tablets. An antidote was quickly administered but the condition was till serious today.

## STEAL LANTERNS FROM HIGHWAYS

### Highway Commission Appeals For Public Aid In Catching Thieves

Indianapolis, July 24. — (United Press). — An appeal to the public for aid in the apprehension of thieves who have been stealing red lanterns from the various construction jobs of the State highway commission was made by officials of the commission today.

Hundreds of the lanterns are stolen each year, according to officials, and while the State does not care to keep replacing them at a monetary loss to the commission funds, the worst feature of the thefts is the fact that the unmarked places may cause serious accidents.

According to A. H. Hinkle, maintenance superintendent every individual desiring a red lantern feels he has a license to steal it from a construction project.

He cited as an illustration a projection State road 22 were nine red lanterns were placed about the work to guide motorists. The following morning but two of the lanterns remained.

Officials feel that much of the stealing would stop if people would realize that they are endangering the lives of many by removing the only means of protection available after nightfall.

Highway forces have been instructed to keep a sharp watch for the thieves and citizens along the various state roads have been asked to cooperate in checking this dangerous thievery.

According to Hinkle it is the duty of the public to help apprehend these thieves and that by doing so they will become public benefactors in that they aid in preventing serious accidents.

### Plans For Dempsey-Tunney Fight Will Be Delayed

Chicago, July 24. — Tex Rickard announced today that all plans for a Dempsey-Tunney match for the world's heavyweight championship will be held up until he makes certain of the legal status of the contract he has with Jack Dempsey.

Wednesday evening Rickard announced that Dempsey would meet Gene Tunney in a title bout in Chicago either on September 11 or September 18. He was inclined to smile at suggestions that he would be unable to stage the fight because of a previous contract Dempsey signed with the Chicago Coliseum club.

The Dempsey-Tunney fight was certain, Rickard said then, and most everyone in town placed their confidence in Rickard.

But last night Rickard was given some fresh information on the matter of the old contract Dempsey had with the Chicago Coliseum club.

He considered this information so important that he announced today nothing would be done regarding the Dempsey-Tunney fight until he investigates his information with the aid of lawyers.

### To Lay Cornerstone For New Methodist Church

Greensburg, Ind., July 24. — (United Press). — Rev. James B. Lathrop, 100, retired Methodist minister and former presiding elder in the Methodist Episcopal church will assist in the laying of the cornerstone at the new Methodist church here Sunday.

The aged minister will aid Bishop Frederick D. Leets in the ceremony of placing the stone in place at the new \$135,000 structure. A brief program has been arranged for the laying of the stone and it is expected several thousand will journey here to witness the event.

### Imperial Wedding

Peking, July 24. — (United Press). — Through understanding with the present republican Government, ancient imperial rites were employed at the wedding of "Prince" Pu Chia, cousin of the former Manchu emperor of China, and Miss Tseng Huang-yuan, daughter of the Home Minister in the Manchu regime.

### "Do It Tomorrow" Invading England

London. — (United Press). — Governmental procrastination in England is beginning to rival that of the Orient, according to a recent statement in the House of Commons by Ronald McNeill, financial secretary to the treasury.

McNeill pointed out that more than four years ago a committee, headed by Lord Meston, was appointed to investigate the grant system in education. An immediate report by the

committee was expected immediately but each month the report was asked for it was promised "in another month."

The final meeting of the committee was called in March 1923 and during the summer of 1924 a complete report was promised to parliament. McNeill declared that the patience of the government, parliament and the public was exhausted awaiting the result of the investigation, but that it would "probably remain exhausted until the committee saw fit to publish it."

### Husband Gets Divorce When Wife Bobs Hair

Paris. — (United Press). — When Madame Marcelle Chautemps decided to shingle her hair she was not aware that she was taking a step which deprived her of a husband. The courts have shown her wherein she erred.

Madame Chautemps surprised her husband one afternoon by coming

back from the barbers without her raven locks about which Monsieur Chautemps had never tired of raving. He was thunderstruck and bitterly reproached his spouse.

"If that's the way you look at it," she rejoined, "there's nothing left for me to do but to go away."

And she went. Monsieur Chautemps, after waiting a certain length of time for his partner to return to the conjugal domicile, brought suit for a legal separation. The courts granted it. Madame Chautemps appealed. The highest court decided that woman who bobs her hair without warning her husband must accept the fate to which she exposes herself. Her appeal was dismissed.
