### Million Gallons of Oil Burned In \$700,000 Fire At Council Bluffs

Council Bluffs, Iowa, July 29.—(United Press.)—One million gallons of oil were consumed in a fire which destroyed the Monarch manufacturing company plant here early today. The loss will approximate \$700,000.

Herodism of firemen prevented the destruction of the Council Bluffs gas house. With the flames but 25 feet away from a tank containing more than 100,000 cubic feet of gas, firemen succeeded in saving the tank and preventing an explosion.

Five other similar tanks were located in the same block and had the flames reached them the resulting explosions would have devastated the region.

Hard work by the fire fighters also saved the International Harvester company plant, Union Pacific, Great Western freight depots and several other large buildings in the vicinity. One fireman was overcome by heat and smoke.

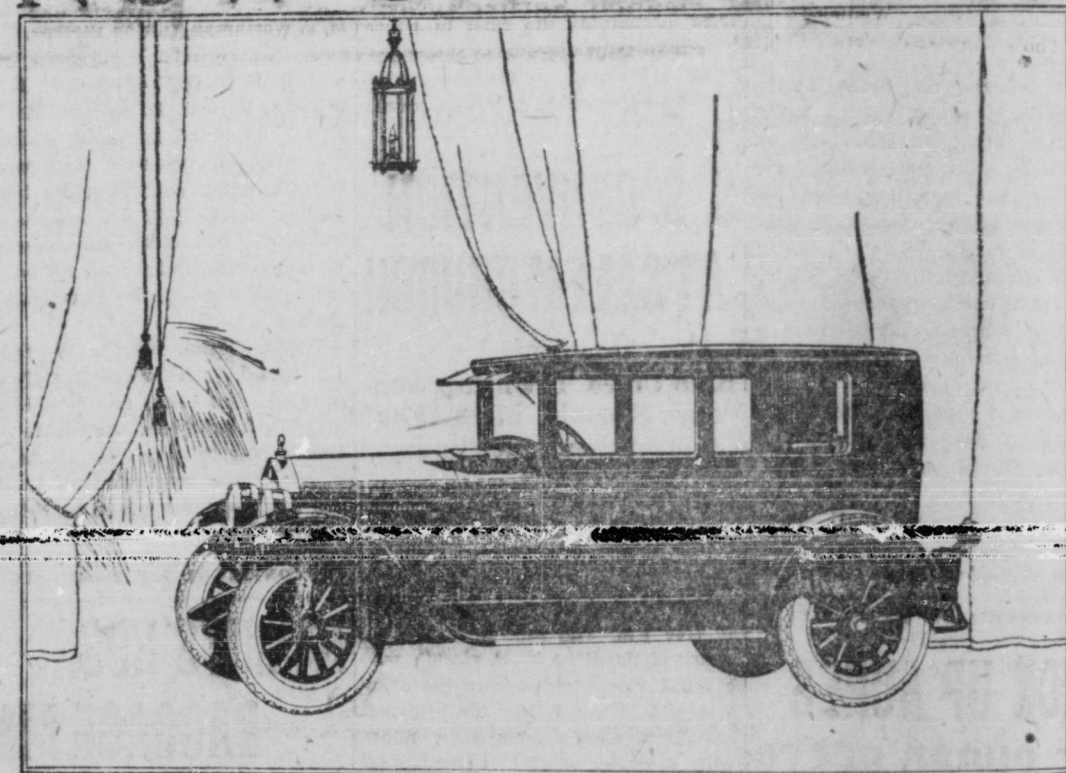


