In presenting the project to the chamber, Poincare confirmed the belief that the government intends to stabilize the franc only after its value has risen from the present level.

nomination for governor, today was leading the field by nearly 10,000 votes. His nearest opponent was W. W. Barnell, farmer, who made a spectacular state-wide campaign without funds other than small amounts supporters dropped in his hat.

On the basis of returns from 1156 precincts out of 3180, the count stood: Johnson 40,662; Darnell 30,963 and Mayor Cargill of Oklahoma City 23,750. Former governor Robertson was fourth with 4,321.

U. S. Senator J. C. Harrell, Republican incumbent, was conceded re-nomination as no one campaigned actively against him.

Elmer Thomas was leading J. C. Walton, deposed governor, in the Democratic senatorial race on the basis of returns from 719 precincts which gave him 24,754 votes while Walton had counted 16,946. Mrs. Lamar LeMay was running behind Lebetter who was third and Meisenheimer, wet candidate, was fifth.

Federal Aid In Mellett Murder Probe Impossible

Washington, Aug. 4.—(United Press)—Federal intervention in the investigation of the murder of Don R. Mellett in Canton, Ohio, is impossible unless a federal connection is discovered, the department of justice announced today after efforts to obtain federal assistance had been made.

A federal narcotic agent was sent to Canton a few days after the murder to investigate an alleged narcotic ring there, but his inquiries have no direct connection with the Mellett case.

### Democratic Action On Registration Law In Doubt

Indianapolis, Ind., Aug. 4.—(United Press)—Democratic action on the question validity of the state registration law was in doubt today with leading democrats in Princeton attending a first district rally.

Republicans decided to ignore the questioned validity of supplemental provisions of the law. Attorney general Gilliom ruled that their constitutionality was inconsequential as the rest of the law is sound.

The state board of election commissioners concurred in the opinion of the Attorney General.

The questioned sections are those enacted by the last legislature providing that the 1924 election poll books shall serve as the registration lists for the coming election.

The legislature failed to amend the title of the act to include reference to the new subject matter as required by the constitution.

### Kendallville Man Is Struck By Automobile

Kendallville, Ind.—Anson Kreider, 66, stock buyer and life long resident of Kendallville is near death today with a crushed skull and other injuries received when he was hit by an auto.

Preble, Aug. 4.—A much needed rain caused the postponement of the baseball game between the Chattanooga, Ohio, and the Preble teams on the local diamond last Sunday. A second game is scheduled for August 29, at Chattanooga.

Local fans are anxiously awaiting the return of the Luther Institute Alumni of Fort Wayne, for a second game, next Sunday. The Alumni defeated the Preble nine in one of the best games played on the local lot by a 4-2 score, several weeks ago. Shay was a first string halfback for two years and in his final year gained recognition by winning a place on the all-state prep eleven. He was also a former member of the school's basketball team.

### Admits Giving Bullish Interview Which Resulted In General Motors Boom

New York, Aug. 4.—(United Press)—From mid-ocean aboard the liner Olympic, Thomas Cochran, partner of J. P. Morgan & Co., today admitted having given a ship news reporter the bullish interview which resulted in a sensational advance in general motor shares on the stock exchange.

Cochran denied, however, having made any predictions on the future price of General Motors stock.

It was stated by Burton Nicholls, reporter for Dow Jones & Co., who obtained the interview.

The statement, released at the Morgan offices, follows:

"In response to inquiries made by a ship news reporter upon my sailing from New York, I spoke with enthusiasm of the earnings, management and prospects of the General Motor corporation. I authorized no statement of any kind as to the future price of the stock, which no one can foretell."

### Lightning Kills Farmer

Evansville, Ind., Aug. 4.—(United Press)—Robert L. Harwood, 62, Union township farmer, was dead today, the victim of a lightning bolt. He was killed at 6 o'clock last night when lightning struck him while he was seeking shelter from rain in a scale house southwest of Evansville.

Perry DeCamp, 25, a neighbor, was burned about the neck and injured in the left eye, by the same bolt.

### Maniac Killer At Large

St. Louis, Aug. 4.—A maniac killer is at large here, police revealed today, sending out a description of George Dibian and asking that police be immediately notified if he is seen.

Dibian escaped from a sanitarium here by picking a lock.

A year ago Dibian went insane attacking Mrs. Albert Fay and stabbing to death the 10 month-old baby which she held in her arms.

### New Outbreak Occurs In Cook County Jail

Chicago, Aug. 4.—(United Press)—All was calm in Cook county jail today following the latest outbreak within its walls—walls which recently have resounded with the merry-making of liquor drinking prisoners, fights, and even an attempted dynamite escape.

The 31 inmates of tier number 6 refused to leave their cells for their regular exercise and Warden George Weidling ordered guards to investigate.

When the guards attempted to enter the cells, they were met with a rapid fire of "billys" made of bed springs, soap and sheeting, razor sharp spoons and other improvised weapons.

### Standard Oil Company Votes Extra Cash Dividend

Chicago, Aug. 4.—(United Press)—For the third time this year directors of the Standard Oil Company of Indiana today voted an extra cash dividend.

The dividend, which is payable Sept. 15, calls for a regular payment of 6 1/2 cents on each share of capital stock and of an extra dividend of 25 cents a share.
