National Banks Show Increases In Resources

Washington, Aug. 10.—Resources of 7,978 reporting national banks in the United States, Alaska and Hawaii amounted to \$25,315,624,000 on July 1, an increase of nearly \$1,000,000 during the year. J. W. McIntosh, comptroller of currency announced today. Loans and discounts, including rediscounts totaled \$13,417,674,000 an increase of \$743,607,000. United States securities owned totaled \$2,469,268,000, a decrease of \$67,499,000.
