Sacknett Gets Producer

G. S. Sacknett, of Pittsburgh, Pa., shot his No. 2 well on the H. L. Sipe farm, Blue Creek township, Tuesday

Indications are that this well will

produce 20 or 25 barrels. Gelatin

was used in shooting this well.

Several new locations were made in the Berne field yesterday for test wells. Harmon and Watts will move

at once to No. 3 on the Smiley

farm, their location being 500 feet

east of No. 2. The same parties will

move at once to No. 7 on the Niblick

farm, which is located near the

Smiley farm.

W. E. McKelvy has moved to No.

2 on the William Bollenbacher farm

in Jefferson township. Alvin C.

Spindler, of Pittsburgh Pa., is plan-

ning to drill a test well at once on

either the Wilson or Nancy Reyn-

olds farms in Jefferson township.

The Wilson lease is a direct offset

to the new Smiley well. "Dad"

Rendall and W. E. McKelvy will drill

their offset to the Smiley well on

the Joe Peel farm in Jefferson town-

ship. G. S. Sacknett probably will

offset the new Smiley well to the

south on the Dan Boze 80-acre farm.

M. S. Daugherty, of Washington

Court House, Ohio, a brother of

Hugh M. Daugherty, former attorney

general of the United States, and

William Kelly, of Geneva, are drill-

ing No. 1 on the B. Parr farm in

Wabash township.

Well Material Shipped In

Ray Grim, of Fort Loramie, Ohio,

will ship an outfit at once for a test

well on either the McDaniel or Zehr

farms, south of the 50-barrel well on

the Niblick farm. Fink and Smith

will move soon to their No. 2 well on

Mrs. Dan Hawbaker's farm, Wa-

bash township.

G. S. Sacknett has shipped in a car-

load of oil well material, enough for

a large number of wells and has

moved the same to the John Parr

farm, east of the Niblick farm.

There are 23 producing wells in

the new Berne field and a large

number of wells are being drilled at

present. Numerous strangers are in

the field now, some of whom are

prospective drillers, while others are

said to be lease speculators.

Dry Hole In Wells County

A well drilled on the Harris farm

in Nottingham township, Wells coun-

ty, a few days ago, proved to be a

dry hole. The sand struck was fine

and not of the variety in which oil

is found. The well will not be shot.

The hole was deeper than those

usually drilled in that territory. No

other well will be drilled in that vi-

cinity at present, it is said.

A well drilled south of Portland

last week by the Bissell Oil company,

will not be put to pumping for some

time. According to the intention of the

operator, to permit it to set for a time

for the purpose of testing it out lat-

er. The rig is being moved to the

Jesse Bentz farm where No. 2 will

be drilled by the Bissell company.

ed might end in death.

Catillo, despite his protest, was

taken to hospital, shortly after he

was brought out of the mine. It is

believed that the injury to his back

is not serious and that he will recov-

er from the effects of the imprison-

ment.

The clothes of the five were black

and soaked with the chill waters that

drip constantly from spar and stal-

agmite in the American Fluorspar and

Zinc company mine. They stripped

off their wet, heavy garments while

little group milled about them.

Calls For His Mules

"I want my mules," was the first

request to Harry Watson, the only

unmarried member of the group. "I

gotta' be gettin' on home."

One of the most maddening ex-

periences of their week in the

depths of the mine was the fact that

they could hear water running some-

where far below them, but were un-

able to reach it.

To quench their terrific thirst the

men sucked water from old, rotten,

watersoaked timbers that supported

the stopping, or high scaffolding, used

in zinc and fluorspar mining to

reach the vein.

The men were rescued by Freeman

Cobb, who crawled into the old shaft

of the mine, through the mud and

dash and met his brother, Randolph

Cobb, and his brother-in-law, Roy

James, who had started to crawl out

of the pocket. These two men were

brought out first. He then went back

after George Catillo, U. B. Wilson and Harry Watson, the remaining three men.

Officials had all but given up hope of rescuing the entombed men alive. More than 500 men worked day and night to reach them. Several others who were in the mine when rock and water started pouring down escaped by fleeing 400 feet before the rush and climbing timbers to safety.

The crew had been operating a drill 600 feet from the mine entrance and were believed to have struck an overhead lake.

The men were in good condition, according to rescuers, but weak
