Wills previously was recognized as the challenger for Dempsey's title.

## Donahy And Cooper Win In Van Wert County

Van Wert, Ohio, Aug. 12.—Lack of county contests in the democratic party kept the total democratic vote east in the primary election here Tuesday down to between 1,400 and 1,500 votes. Governor Vic Donahy was an easy winner in Van Wert county, getting a total of 999 votes, to 385 for A. P. Sandles, 49 for James C. B. Beatty, and 48 for J. H. Kaufman. There were several close contests in the vote in the republican primary here. There was a total of 2,343 votes cast for the republican candidates for governor. Myers Y. Cooper received 1,223 votes, while his opponent for the gubernatorial nomination, Thad Brown, received 934 votes.

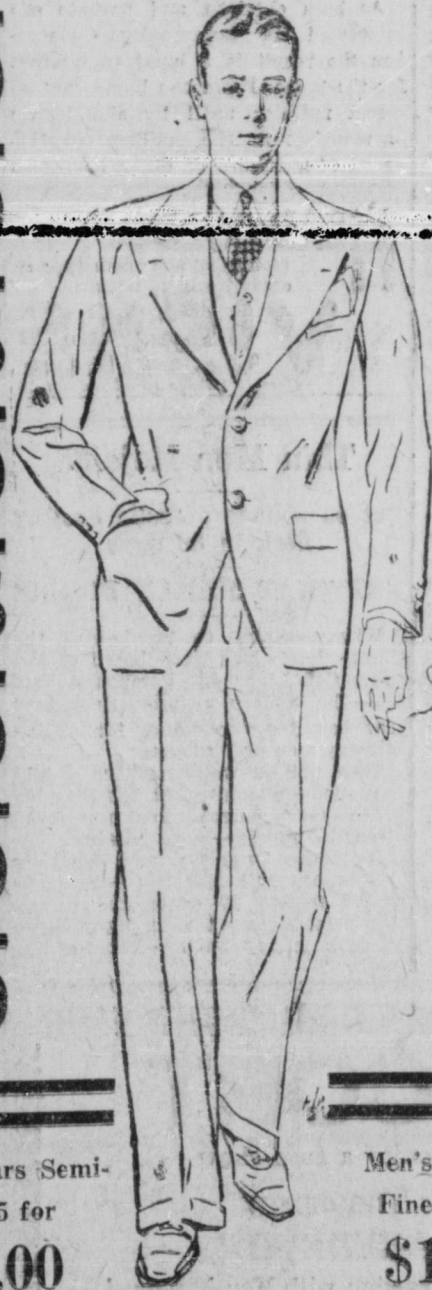
