OUTLINES FIGHT AGAINST BORER

State Entomologist Recommends Steps To Be Taken To Halt Corn Borer

Indianapolis, Ind., Aug. 12.—(United Press)—An office and experimental station will be established at once in Steuben county where the European corn borer was discovered last week.

The establishment of such a station was recommended by Frank E. Wallace, state entomologist and approved by Governor Ed. Jackson and marks

the beginning of an organized effort to prevent the spread of the corn borer in Indiana.

The following points were contained in Wallace's recommendation, transmitted to State conservation director Richard Lieber and approved by Governor Jackson.

1. Establishment of an office and laboratory in Steuben county.

2. Maintenance of two small automobiles for the use of experts who will circulate in the infested territory.

3. Launching of a fall and winter educational campaign in counties adjoining the infested area.

4. Proposal to require elimination of corn refuse, such as cobs and stalks, to prevent propagation of the borer. The state to bear this expense if farmers do not, the money later to be collected through taxes.

Wallace is planning to confer with L. H. Worthley, Federal corn borer administrator preparatory to the establishment of quarantines, in the infested areas.

Governor Modifies Stand On Sunday Auto Racing

Indianapolis, Ind., Aug. 12.—(United Press)—Yielding in his erstwhile firm stand against Sunday automobile racing, Governor Ed. Jackson has made it known that he will institute no war against the sport until requested by local citizens.

It has been pointed out that there has been a revival of the sport in several centers, especially at Crown Point, and the Governor was asked if he would pursue his former course of ordering local police officers to stop the races at all cost.

Indicating that it is largely a local problem, Jackson declared he would not interfere unless importuned by local citizenry.

Rightful Heirs Of Man And Woman Killed In Auto Wreck In Doubt

Shelbyville, Ind., Aug. 12.—(United Press)—Executors of the wills of Mr. and Mrs. Warren Wasson today are trying to determine the rightful heirs to the property left when the couple

were killed in a grade crossing accident July 31.

Both were dead when the first persons reached the scene and, not being able to ascertain who died first, executors cannot determine whether their estate should go to his or her relatives.
