ually dragged me into a room where he
and a friend of his were sitting. The
Prince leered at me and spoke in some
strange tongue to her while I talked in
English with his companion. A young
chap named Syed, son of a Persian,
son of a Persian Mowib. From then on
I was forced to see the Delhi Prince
every time he called.

After he had been coming to my
home for about a month, the woman

told me the Prince wanted me. I later
found he had offered 3,000 rupees to
persuade me to go to him.

I simply flew at my husband. He
her for any indiscretions the Prince
might have had in mind. But Abani
still remained nice to the Prince, often
had him to our home for dinner and
even suggested that we accept the
Prince's invitation to live with him
in his palace.

When I wouldn't hear of such a
thing, my husband began trying to
get all of my money. Putting two and

was land poor, as I later found he was,
that he was, really in league with
the English adventurers to "sell
me" to the Delhi Prince, and following
that, he wanted my money, which by

a few hundred pounds from me, but
instead of paying me back, he kept
trying to "borrow" more. I finally be-
gan to evade his requests for rupees.
I was sorry later that I did.

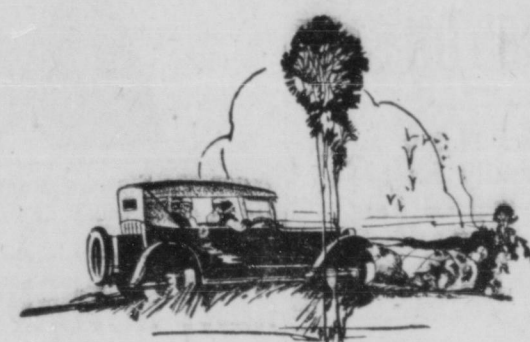

Constitution" was framed in 1857. View of

Near Big Spring on Union Pacific Highway
No. 10.
- 4—Storm Lake, Iowa, a beautiful resort region.
State Highways No. 4 and No. 5.
- 5—Indian fortifications north of Fourteen Mile
Creek, Indiana. Peculiar formation over 200
feet high and in one place hardly a rod wide.
Near Charlestown on Wonderland Way No. 24
from Madison.
- 6—Mount Baldy, one of the largest sand dunes in
the world, at Saugatuck, Michigan. State High-
way No. 11.
- 7—Mille Lacs District in Minnesota, where the
pine forests and oak forests meet. Fishing is
very good in this district. State Highway No.
18 from Brainerd follows the shore of Mille Lac.
- 8—Sibley, Missouri, where Fort Osage was es-
tablished in 1809, during Osage Indian War,
one of the eastern terminals of the old Santa Fe
Trail. Near Buckner on National Old Trails
Road No. 6.
- 9—Trempealeau Mountain, Wisconsin, where
Perrot, the French explorer, landed in 1685.
Name derived from the French meaning "the
hill which soaks in the water." Bold piece of
scenery. State Highway No. 162 from Holmen.
- 10—Crystal Cave, near Sturgis, South Dakota, with
1,500 chambers of mystic beauty. Via Pied-
mont, State Highway No. 30.
