Garage Man Accidentally Shot By 16-Year-Old Girl

Gas City, Ind., Aug. 14.—(United Press)—Authorities today are probing the death of Clifton Gray, 25, Gas City garage operator, who was accidentally shot and killed by Miss June Pyles, 16, last night.

Miss Pyles was examining a revolver in front of Gray's garage when the gun was accidentally discharged and the bullet entered Gray's abdomen. He died of hemorrhage within a few minutes.

Munition Works At Vienna Explodes

Vienna, Aug. 14.—(United Press)—

Confused reports of damage and death resulting from the explosion of the Wjess Munition works at Budapest complicated the story today.

The official Hungarian news agency was minimizing the story, even denying some of its own dispatches of Thursday.

Dispatches received today said that 24 watchmen who had been believed killed in the explosion had been found safe although rendered temporarily deafened by the shocks. The official agency reported that 40 persons had been seriously injured and 200 slightly injured.
