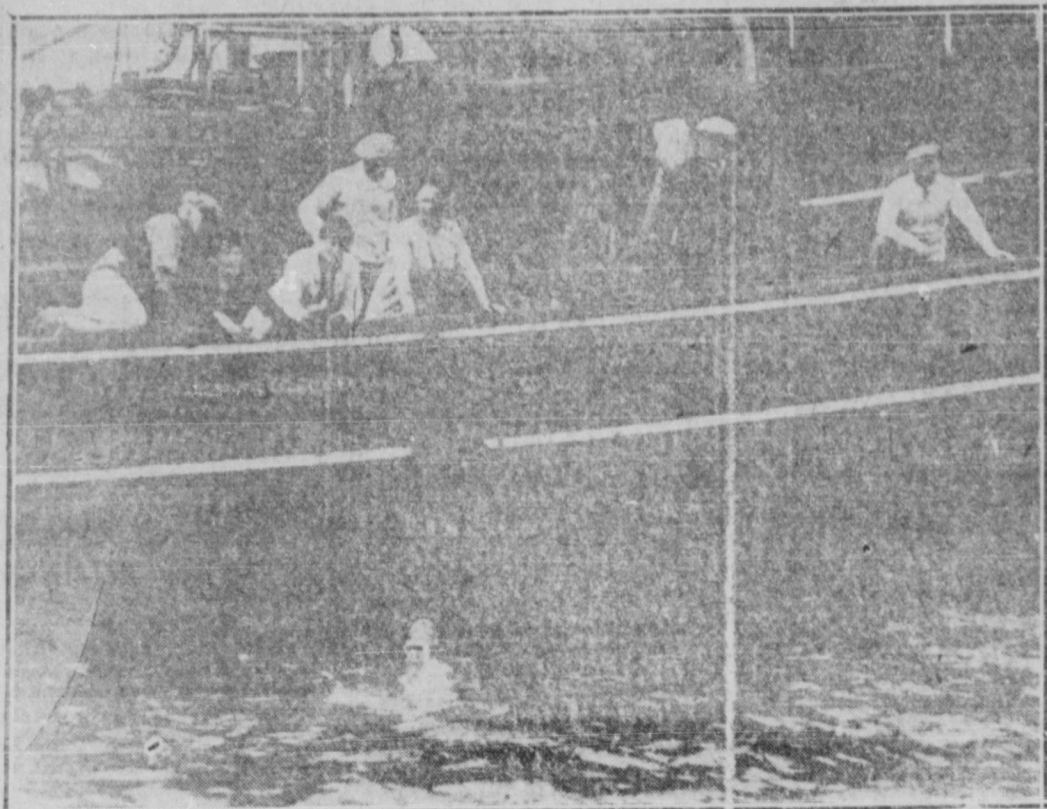


# Gertrude Ederle Swims Channel!

## DEMPSEY WILL MEET TUNNEY

### Tex Rickard Announces He Will Stage Fight in Philadelphia Sept. 23

New York, Aug. 19.—(United Press) All the weeks of squabbling over the Jack Dempsey-Gene Tunney heavy-weight championship prize fight was ended today when Tex Rickard literally picked up the fight and started to Philadelphia with it, announcing it would be held there Sept. 23, in the great Sesqui-Centennial stadium.

By his sudden move Rickard changed the bout from merely a cause of endless argument into potentially one of the greatest sporting spectacles ever held.

The great stadium will seat 150,000 people, which is more than ever had a chance to see such an affair before.

Rickard estimated that with a top price of \$30 and a bottom figure of \$5.50 he would have a gate of \$2,000,000, more than a half million dollars over the receipts which would have been expected had the fight been held in New York Sept. 16 as planned.

Dempsey will get a minimum of \$150,000 and may get thousands more if the contract is revised to give him a share in the increased receipts.

Rickard, although he will lose his preliminary investment made in preparation for the fight in New York, stands to make hundreds of thou-

sands. The Sesqui-Centennial exposition will get 10 per cent of the gross receipts respectively on a basis of \$2,000,000 receipts.

The decision to move the fight to Philadelphia was a complete surprise. Only yesterday Rickard still was talking of suing to force the New York boxing commission to license Dempsey for the fight here.

Then last night he suddenly announced that the fight would go to Philadelphia.

He revealed that all arrangements had been made; that the promoters of the Sesqui-Centennial exposition had not only approved but actually begged for the bout; that Mayor

Kendrick of Philadelphia had given his support; that Governor Pinchot of Pennsylvania had agreed to approve the fight if the Pennsylvania state boxing authorities did; and the Pennsylvania boxing commission had enthusiastically consented.

Members of the boxing commission, center of the long wrangle which had ended with the transfer of the fight to Philadelphia, had little to say except that they were sorry the fight couldn't be held here.

Rickard hardly had made the announcement than he started moving his organization to Philadelphia. Morning trains took the first clerks and various attaches. Rickard himself was expected to reach Philadel-
