urge everybody to be sure and hear
him.

The following is taken from the
Presbyterian magazine: "There re-
sides in Chicago a minister who has
abridged every book in the Bible,
using only its own words and yet
selecting the portions that give the
main facts of events and teachings of
each book, and has committed all of
these books to memory so that he can
recite them without a moment's hesi-
tation or the error of a word. He
simply stands still, with arms hang-
ing by his side and making no ges-
ture, recites the narrative in a quiet,
musical voice with just enough
emphasis and modulation to bring
out the meaning. The effect is a sur-
prise and at times is startling. Every
one is surprised at how the old fami-
liar narratives seem new and what
a depth and richness of meaning and
suggestion they have."

The Tonawanda, N. Y. Daily Even-
ing News writes the following: "The
effect of these Bible readings is in-
describable. Mr. Halley has no pet
theological positions to expound and
no theories to uphold. He simply
reads the Book itself and lets it tell
its own story. One man, a scholar of
standing, remarked after hearing him
'I have already received more good
than I would from the reading of fifty
books about the Bible.'"
