Velvet Hats To Be Popular This Fall

New York, Sept. 2.—(United Press)—New styles, fads and accessories confront one each day as fall approaches and while it is still too early to indulge in bonnets and frocks of Winter fabrics we can be forming an idea of what is what in Smartland.

Velvet seems to be the outstanding fabric for hats. Both dull and bright colors are used. Shapes vary from tams, crushed turbans and small brimmed sports models to widebrimmed affairs. Often two colors of velvet are combined in sort of a patchwork manner to form tam shapes. Many of the velvet tams in the shops must be draped and tacked to suit the wearer. Felt and grosgrain ribbon combine to form some of the smartest of tam or sports shapes, and though felt will

be popular it will undoubtedly be a season of velvet millinery.

Linings used in fur coats this season are extremely lovely since many of them are embroidered or appliqued with velvet flowers down the side-fronts or around the hem. Many furriers are showing unlined fur coats permitting one to select one gown lining and flared design. This is far more sensible than showing a readylined coat since two women have the same idea as to linings. One can have one of these exquisite embroidered linings placed in a coat for \$25 at several shops. An unusual lining shown by an uptown furrier has a Nile green background with embroidered orchids worked on the front. Hugh velvet roses adorn a black-lined sealcoat.

Zipper bathing shoes of bright colored suede are among the Mid-Summer novelties. Red, green, yellow, white and black are the colors found among these zippered models. The zipper

fastening extends up the center front of the shoe.

Palid and checked velveteens are on display in several department stores. They can be made up into straightlined coats and into sports frocks, most effectively.

Little bunches of glass flowers or grapes are new millinery trimmings which may replace rhinestone ornaments. White and bright colored transparent glass is used and these little ornaments glisten like dewdrops.

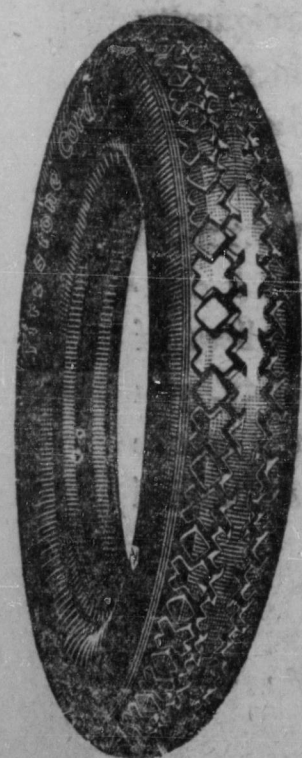
