Probe Of Fatal Traction Wreck In Michigan Opens

Monroe, Mich., Sept. 3.—(United Press)—In an effort to fix responsibility for the head on collision of two interurban cars here yesterday afternoon, resulting in the death of eight persons and injury of 25 others, officials of the local and county today planned to closely question William Owen, veteran motorman of the south bound car.

The two cars, of the Detroit, Monroe and Toledo Shore line, came together on a 2,000 foot curve while travelling at approximately 40 miles an hour, according to witnesses.

According to one official, Owen has been accused of attempting to make up lost time, and failure to make a scheduled stop at Pine siding to await the other car. He jumped and escaped with minor injuries, going to his home at Toledo.

Ward Boss' Home Bombed
Chicago, Sept. 3.—(United Press)—The home of Morris Eller, Chicago political ward leader, was wrecked here early today by a bomb believed planted by political enemies.

Although Eller's entire family was hurried from bed and half of the house was demolished, no one was injured.

Smith Refuses To Drop Out Of Senatorial Race

Aurora, Ill., Sept. 3.—(United Press)—A blunt refusal to withdraw from the race for the U. S. senate was Frank L. Smith, republican nominee, answer to a call to quit the race last night. Smith's representative, Attorney General Oscar Carleton of Illinois, made the announcement.

Smith's stand at the central states fair here.

Pressure had been brought to bear on Smith to have him withdraw following revelations of large gifts to his campaign fund by utility interests, brought out in the recent senatorial primary campaign fund inquiry.

Two Killed When Lone Bandit Attempts Holdups

Gary, Ind., Sept. 3.—(United Press)—Two men were dead, and a third was badly wounded as a result of shooting during a lone bandit's raid on Gary business houses in the center of the city at midnight last night.

Harry Bolds, the bandit who attempted to hold up business houses single handed, was killed in the embroglio after a pistol duel from taxi cab windows with Policeman Michael Flynn. Bolds had just killed Chester Coetenborder, a pool room clerk who had refused to open the safe in his office. Flynn was shot through the body. Physicians say he has no chance for recovery.

BUILDING MANY SCHOOL HOUSES

Indiana Taxpayers Spending \$11,000,000 On New School Buildings

Indianapolis, Ind., Sept. 3.—(United Press)—Indiana taxpayers are spending more than \$11,000,000 this year on new school buildings and improvement on buildings according to survey made by the state department of public instructions.

Results of the survey were announced today at the office of Dr. Henry N. Sherwood, state superintendent of public instruction.

Of the total amount represented in contracts let during the year ending August 1, approximately \$8,000,000 was spent for city and town schools and about \$3,000,000 for rural school buildings.

Indianapolis, with its \$2,000,000 school building program, ranked first in activity. Fort Wayne was second with an estimated expenditure of about one million dollars.

Other cities engaged in heavy building campaigns were: Terre Haute, \$19,000; Evansville, \$640,000; Michigan City, \$286,000; Wabash, \$285,000; Richmond, \$230,000; Valparaiso, \$200,000; Hammond, \$175,000; Bloomington, \$150,000; Mishawaka, \$149,000; and Anderson, \$146,000.

Benton county heads the list in large expenditures for township schools with an estimate of \$375,000. Knox county ranks second with a \$340,000 building program.

Other cities engaged in heavy building expenditures were: Allen, \$254,000; Tippecanoe, \$215,000; Union, \$157,000; Laporte, \$124,000; Clark, \$117,000; Lake, \$115,000; and Jasper, \$107,000.

Commenting on the survey, Dr. Sherwood said:

"When we consider that the sum of \$11,000,000 is being spent annually for school house construction in the state of Indiana, we cannot help but feel the necessity for careful planning. New buildings should be located to serve the maximum number of students. They should be so constructed as to be most servicable to future generations.

"Taxpayers may well take time to study carefully the building needs and plans of their respective communities.
