### H. S. A. A. Refuses To Reinstate South Side

Friendship, Wis., Sept. 13.—(United Press)—Trapped when their home caught fire Jack Hoffmaster, farmer, and his two children were burned to death near here today.

### Boy Killed By Auto At Van Wert, Saturday

Van Wert, Ohio, Sept. 13.—(United Press)—The annual effort to de-bone big Bill Tilden, tennis champion began here today.

Sixty-three of the world's ranking players will compete in the national championship, starting at two o'clock when S. Howard Yoshell takes the court against Watson M. Washington and Henri Cochet of France meets W. W. Ingraham.

Tilden, six time champion, may have the hardest battle of his career this year. He has shown symptoms of falling off lately and has been beaten by Vincent Richards, A. H. Chapin and Rene LaCoste—by the latter in the Davis cup matches last week, the first time Tilden had been defeated in Davis cup play.

Bill Johnston, the former champion is perhaps the most formidable contender.

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
