## MEXICO OBJECTS TO MOB ACTION

### Foreign Government Com- plaints Of Torturing And Killing of 2 Mexicans

Washington, Sept. 18.—(United Press.)—The Mexican government has instructed its embassy here to make representations to the state department against the alleged torturing and killing of two Mexicans at Raymondville, Texas, recently.

According to unofficial reports, Thomas Munez and his son were forcibly removed by a mob from the Raymondville jail, tortured and shot. The elder Munez is said to have been beheaded.

A detailed account of the affair is expected today and will be carried to the state department by Ambassador Tellez.

### Massachusetts Court Rules Against Sunday Sports

Boston, Sept. 18.—(United Press.)—The full bench of the Massachusetts supreme court today ruled against Sunday baseball.

The adverse action of the state's highest court also affects Sunday football or any other outdoor sports in connection with which admission is charged.

Action by the court came in the form of a peremptory writ of mandamus, commanding Secretary of State Frederick W. Cook to omit from the ballot at the November election a proposed law under which certain sports would be permitted on the Sabbath and admission charges allowed.

## Bandit Menace Causes Many Guests To Leave Resort Cities

Mexico City, Sept. 18.—(United Press.)—Many tourists have fled from Cuernavaca and other resort cities because of the bandit menace.

The government has issued stringent orders to exterminate the outlaws, one band of which is held responsible for the slaying of Jacob Rosenthal, wealthy New York business man.

Police are questioning three members of the bandit gang which kidnaped Rosenthal in an effort to learn the whereabouts of other members of the gang.

The Mexican foreign office today was confronted with a second demand from the United States government for the apprehension and punishment of all guilty participants in the kidnapping and slaying.

The new note was delivered personally by Arthur Lane, first secretary of the embassy.

Former President Obregon who was captured and released by Yaquis Indians several days ago, is reported safe in the town of Navojia today.

## Two French Stars Fight It Out For Tennis Title

Forest Hills, N. Y., Sept. 18.—(United Press.)—Which citizen of France will be the first to become the tennis champion of America will be determined today.

The choice is narrowed down to two—Rene Lacoste or Jean Borotra—and experts here seemed to favor Lacoste.

The American men's singles championship play became a French civil war last night when, as the sun was setting, Vincent Richards, the sole American hope in the semi-finals, bowed to Borotra.

Richards started out strong enough taking the first set, and finally the score reached two 3-4. But the Frenchman was too strong and he took the decisive set 6-2.

Previous to the elimination of Richards, Lacoste beat Henri Cochet, eliminating the man who had defeated Big Bill Tilden, the American champion. The scores were 2-6, 4-6, 6-4, and 6-3.
