DEATH LIST AT
HOLLYWOOD IS 30

Number Of Victims Is Much
Lower Than At First

Hollywood, Fla., Sept. 22.—(United Press) — While rescue workers still searched the debris for victims of the West Indian hurricane of Saturday, officials told the United Press today that the death list here will not exceed 80.

Be Postponed Until Fri-
day If It Rains

Philadelphia, Pa., Sept. 22.—(United Press)—If rain, as forecast by the weather bureau, makes it impossible to stage the world's heavyweight championship battle between Jack Dempsey and Gene Tunney tomorrow, the fight will take place Friday, Tex Rickard said today.

"If rain looks inevitable in the evening," we may postpone it without waiting for the ring to get soaked," Tex said.
