dove, water, oil, and fire. The works of the Holy Spirit also speak of His power and importance, these are seven in number. They are: conversion; conviction; baptism; filling; earnest; sealing; and anointing.

"Out of this promise of power made by Christ to His disciples, three questions arise: The age-long struggle of man has been for power. To procure more power he has scanned the heavens, delved into the bowels of the earth, dived into the depths of the sea; tunneled the mountains; bridged the rivers. Back of every prayer prayed, every sermon preached, every gift of talent, every effort made by the Christian, is the desire for more power. The weakness of the Christian church is sufficient answer to the question: Do we need power?"

"Where does spiritual power come from? The church finds more or less power in concentration; Specialization; organization; cooperation; sociability; money and so forth. All of these are good, but none can be successfully substituted for the power of the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit without these will make a church; but these without the Holy Spirit will never make a church.

"What is the result of revealing the power? Jesus said: 'Ye shall be witnesses unto Me.' Every Christian must be a witness. A witness is one who tells what he knows. Natural ability, plus broadcloth, will make a preacher; but only a spirit-filled person will make an effective witness."

TO REVEAL POWER HELD IN INDIANA BY STEPHENSON

ed "sign on the dotted line by drawing up formal contracts to let him dictate appointments to be made by him when they took office.

Even the jury system of the state was corrupted under the evil influence of the Stephenson system, Adams asserted. He said information had been uncovered that word was passed out from Stephenson's office in Indianapolis to "do" or "don't" in cases in which the Klan dragon was interested and that the juries followed these orders.

"Stephenson forced a superoath in the vitals of the public officials and leaders who allied themselves with his machine and made them 'like it,' Adams said the investigation had shown.

"This superoath was greater than the oath of constitutional authority and any official who took the oath by so doing automatically resigned his office for the office itself was vacat-

ed by the act of the superoath. This is the opinion of jurists who have examined a copy of the original oath."

Serious charges have already been placed with the American Bar Association against certain officials and lawyers as a result of the investigation, Adams announced.

The information obtained by the investigators will be placed before state and federal grand juries with a demand for a thorough house cleaning of the Stephenson faction in Indiana politics, Adams said.

MERTON CALLED BACK TO STAND

German Recalled As Chief Defense Witness In Daugherty Case

New York, Sept. 28.—(United Press)—Richard Merton, of Frankfurt, Germany, came back as the chief witness in the Daugherty-Miller conspiracy trial today.

He was called at the first witness or the defense after the government had completed its case against former Attorney General Harry M. Daugherty and Thos. W. Miller, former alien property custodian charged with conspiracy to defraud the government.

Col. Wm. Rand of the defense staff questioned Merton carefully, first as to conversations Merton had had with R. E. Williams, assistant to Miller, before he applied for return of \$7,000,000 assets of the American Metal Company.

Merton maintained that while Williams gave him worth while information he "used his own judgement" in making his application.

Earth Tremors Felt In Southern California Today

Los Angeles, Sept. 28.—(United Press)—Several southern California cities experienced a distinct earthquake today. Buildings were slightly shaken at Santa Barbara and Ventura. Other cities along the southern California coast as far south as Glendale, near Los Angeles felt the shock.

No damage was reported.

To Seek Thirteen Million Dollars For Prohibition

Washington, D. C. Sept. 28.—(United Press)—Thirteen million dollars for the Government's dry enforcement fight in the next fiscal year will be sought by the treasury department.

Assistant secretary of treasury Andrews, chief of enforcement work, announced today he would ask the budget bureau to seek from congress this amount, which equals the appropriation for the current year.

Cold Snap Due To Stay

Chicago, Sept. 28.—(United Press)—The Midwest will have at least another day of unseasonal cold weather which has gripped the section since for the last two days, the weather bureau in Chicago predicted today.
