INDEPENDENT NET LEAGUE ORGANIZED

Eight Cities Have Teams In League Formed In Meeting At Muncie

Muncie, Sept. 30.—The Central Indiana Independent Basketball League is a sure go.

Tuesday evening, at a meeting in Muncie of the managers of a number of the outstanding independent net teams in Central Indiana the league was organized. The circuit will have eight teams, seven of the number already having contracted to take part and the other to be added to the list within the next few days.

The teams already entered include the Miami Indians, Richmond Pals, Yorktown Merchants, Kokomo Legion Muncie-Gaston Independents, Shelbyville Eagles, and Matthews Old Orchard. The eighth team will be selected from the Hoosier Athletic Club team of Indianapolis, Newcastle, Rushville and Portland Independents.

Despite the fact that this will be the first independent league of its kind in the state, those connected with it feel confident that it will be a big success.

W. V. Winder was elected president and secretary of the league. His duty will be to decide on eligibility matters and other important questions that will come up prior to and after the opening of the loop.

The league will be divided, the first half getting under way the latter part of October and ending Christmas week. After a two weeks' layoff the second half of the season will open and the league standing will start over again. The present plan is to hold an elimination series at the end of the season to decide the league champion. Although it was not definitely decided it is probable that the winners of first, second and possibly third positions in each leg of the league will take part in the final and championship deciding series.

During the season each team enrolled in the circuit will play twenty-eight league games, fourteen of the number coming before Christmas and as many afterwards.

Each team will be allowed to carry ten men. Two weeks following the opening game of the season the managers will send in their lists of eligible men. The first two weeks will give the needed time for all tryouts. After this, any player being expelled from league play for a period of twenty days. During this time, should he sign with another club, it will be necessary that the league head be notified ten days in advance.

At the next meeting, which will convene next Tuesday evening at the Y. M. C. A. the organization will be completed, the eighth team named, and the schedule drawn.

MUCH EXPECTED OF PAGE AT I. U.

New Coach Has Light Team To Hurl At Opponents This Season

Bloomington, Ind., Sept. 29.—Coach Pat Page who made Butler famous has a light Indiana University football team to hurl at DePauw here Saturday and the Big Ten Conference teams which come later in the season. However, if Hoosier grid followers will exercise their memories a little they will recall that Page started Butler off with a light team that swept Zuppke's famous Illinois eleven off its feet, 10 to 7. That is the same thing Pat may do at Indiana. What he lacks in weight he must make up with fight and speed.

Indiana's big "white hope" this season appears to be in its football coach who has retained all of his grit, fight and determination to turn out a winning team. He has about forty candidates remaining on the squad, the other dozen being scared out after a few nights of gruelling practice sessions under Foxy Pat.

Page has always developed a great quarterback on his teams. He has sifted his candidates down to about three men. Captain Sibley who has always played end has a leading hold on the berth, with Temp Smith, Indianapolis, a good second hold. Temp was out of school last year but is a nifty open field runner and can pass

with fair accuracy. The other candidate is Richard Garrison, also of Indianapolis. He is light and lacks college experience but can pass, kick, and run better than the average sophomore.

For center Page has two men, one a veteran, Russell Kelso, of New Albany, and the other a sophomore, Clare Randolph, Elkhart, who captioned the fresh last fall. Randolph is heavier than Kelso but like the quarter aspirants, lacks college experience. The New Albany player may be shifted to a guard or tackle, thus giving Randolph the pivot.

At end, Jack Winston, tall guard on the basketball team, probably will be one wingman while at the other end position Page has Ferdie Nessel, of Marion, that is, if Sibley takes quarter. Winston has been playing around for two years but should produce this season under Pat.

W. Fisher, the last of the well known Fishers on the Indiana team, is the only real heavyweight on the squad and he has the earmarks of being a good tackle. He is a hard fighter but is prone to be slow at times. At the other tackle, George Bishop appears to be the main choice, although Butts and Hellman have been making a strong scrap for the place. Bishop played guard last season but Page has him slated as a better man for tackle. His only hold-back is the fact he is light.

Coach Page is counting on Louis Briner, Garrett, who made such a good showing against Purdue last year. He is also somewhat of a place kicker. For the other place here are several fairly good fighters but they are all lightweights and won't average over 160 pounds, if that much. Robert Zaiser, Indianapolis; W. Fullam, Churubusco, and Robert Matthews, Gary, are fighting to out for the berth with any one of them a neat chance to win.

Now for the backfield. There are no natural born and experienced fullbacks. Bill Moss, Jasonville, is a plunging player but he has never played in a college game. "Chuck" Bennett, Linton, another sophomore, has been making a stab for the position but again the experience is not present. W. Stephenson, a quarter-back on the track team, has been going after the place tooth and nail and has a mighty good chance of landing it.

Herman Byers, Evansville, looks best for a halfback job. He exhibited quite a bit of cleverness last season and has put on a little weight but is still light. Harrell, Indianapolis, is another candidate for half but he is only a sophomore. Art Becker who was high scorer in basketball last winter, has been getting a lot of attention from Pat. So has Vojtech, Chicago.
