YELLOW JACKETS MEET PORTLAND

D. H. S. Varsity Meets Old Rivals In First Home Game Here Saturday

Decatur high school's Yellow Jackets will make their first appearance on the home gridiron next Saturday afternoon, when they take the field against their time-honored rivals, the Portland Panthers. This will be one of the only two home games on the schedule this fall and a large crowd of fans is expected to witness the contest. The kick-off is scheduled for 2:15 o'clock, sharp. Owing to the wet condition of the field east of the river bridge, it will be necessary to play the game on the South Ward gridiron.

Coach Marshall and his assistant, Coach Curtis, have been working the Yellow Jackets hard this week in preparation for the Portland game, and the warriors were declared to be in good condition today. The players who were injured in the early games have practically recovered and will be in the game Saturday. Portland has won two games, defeating Celina, Ohio, and Anderson, and has lost one game, to one to Richmond by a score of 10-0 last Saturday.

The Junior band will be out Saturday to add pep to the game. The high school pupils have been holding pep meetings and are preparing to furnish plenty of rooting. Pre-game dope indicates that the two teams will be evenly matched and a great game is anticipated.
