PETITION FOR MACADAM ROAD

Before the Board of Commissioners
Adams County, Indiana

STATE OF INDIANA
COUNTY OF ADAMS SS:
We, the undersigned, each and all of whom are resident adult freeholders and voters of Adams Township, in Adams County, Indiana, respectfully petition your honorable body and ask that you construct and complete a free macadamized stone road in said township, over and upon and along the public highway situated upon the following route, in Adams county, Indiana, to-wit:

Commencing in the center of section twenty-six (26) in township twenty-six (26), north of range fourteen (14) east, thence running west on and along and over the public highway to the north-west corner of the south-west quarter of said section twenty-six (26) and there to terminate.

Your petitioners avers and says that the improvement prayed for is less than three (3) miles in length, connects at both ends with a free macadam road in said township already established and in use, and one of the public highways of said township, and the improvement thereof as herein prayed for will be of public utility and benefit to the people of said township, and that said improvement is now being made.

Your petitioners ask that said public highway above described be graded and graded and that said improvement be made upon the said road as it is now located.

Your petitioners further ask that said highway be improved to the width it now is, being about forty (40) feet and that the same be graded to a width of twenty-eight (28) feet and that crushed stone be placed on the sides thereof of sixteen (16) feet and to the depth of six (6) inches at the sides thereof and eight (8) inches in the center thereof, and that stone screenings be placed thereon to a proper depth; that said road be made a single track road, and that the name of the same be the Daniel Stepler Macadam Road.

That to pay for said improvement we ask that bonds be issued by the county of Adams in the State of Indiana, in the sum of twenty semi-annual installments or series, and for the payment of which we ask that a tax be levied upon the taxable property of Adams County, Indiana, in a sufficient amount to pay the interest and principal of said bonds as they become due.

That said improvement be made and constructed and that said bond be issued and said tax be levied upon the taxable property of Adams County, Indiana, in accordance with the Acts of the Legislature of the State of Indiana, passed in the year 1907 now in force, provided for extension of free gravel or macadam roads and all other amendments thereto.

We further ask that the Board take all of the necessary steps required by law to have said improvement constructed and as petitioned herein, and that the same be constructed without submitting the question of building the same to an election of the voters of said Monroe township and that the Board construct the same under the laws of the State of Indiana, provided for the extension of free gravel or macadam roads to township taxation.

guaranteed price, stated that there was an increased consumption of sugar and the outlook for a good market for the coming year was excellent.

The sugar company also offers a liberal feature whereby the beet grower may participate up to forty-nine per cent of the sugar packed from a ton of beets in the case where sufficient tonnage is received to insure a maximum run for the factory.

The sugar beet is immune from the attack of the corn borer, which has started to invade this section of the country, and the beets fit in well with the general farm crop rotation. These two features of the crop are being called to the attention of the farmers in this vicinity.
