MOTOR CLUB WILL TEST LAW

Right Of Justices Of Peace And Mayors To Try Motorists To Be Tested

Indianapolis, Ind., Mar. 18.—(United Press)—Plans were being laid today by Walter Pritchard, attorney for the Hoosier Motor Club, for legal action to test the authority of justices of the peace and mayors of small Indiana towns to try motorists on charges of traffic law violations.

Formation of plans was started following a meeting of the directors of the club here to discuss the long fight waged by the Hoosier motorists against alleged illegal and unfair

trials of motorists of the state at which justices of the peace have been accused of imposing unjust fines.

A test case will be brought in circuit court here whenever a motorist is fined by a mayor or justice. Refusal to pay the fine will result in jailing of the motorist and habeas corpus proceedings will be brought by the club to affect a release. The test will be based on a recent decision of the U. S. Supreme court that an Ohio mayor was disqualified from acting as a judge when he received part of the fine assessed against the defendants.

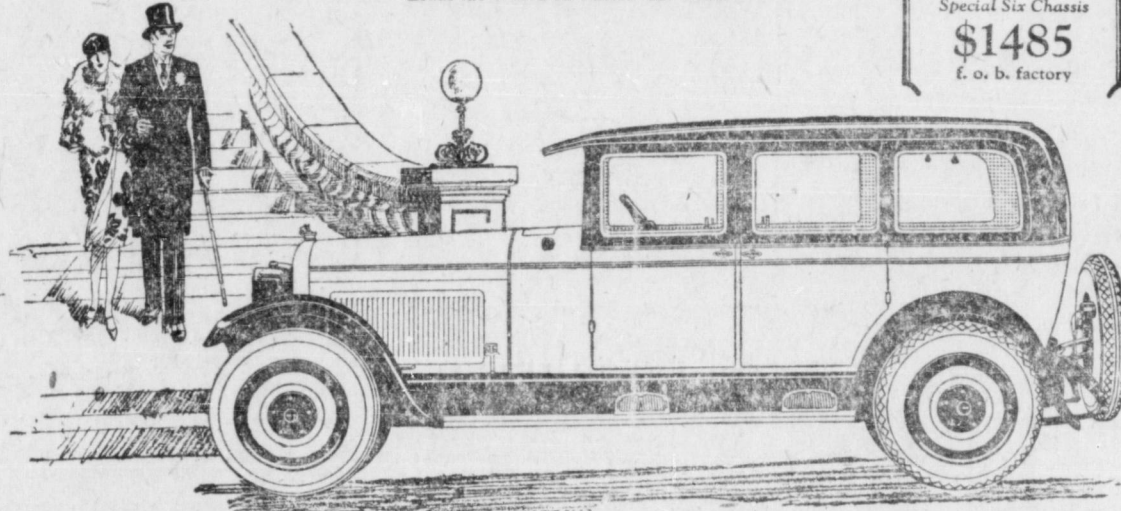
