Deputy Bank Commissioner Issues Statement Regarding Bluffton Bank

Bluffton, April 1.—The situation relative to the Studabaker Bank and the Studabaker State Bank is explained in a statement furnished Thursday for publication which reads as follows:

"Statement to the public in re Studabaker Bank.

"Mr. Thomas D. Barr, Deputy Bank Commissioner, stated today that in order that there might be no misunderstanding in the public mind regarding the Studabaker Bank and the Studabaker State Bank, that the Department of Banking wished to make in plain that the new bank, which was tentatively organized last Friday night was formed with a view to taking over the assets and assume deposit liabilities of the old bank. Circumstances have since developed which rendered this course impractical. It should be definitely understood that the directors of the new bank did not in any way, shape, form, or manner, bind themselves that the deposits of the old bank would be paid. It is the opinion of the banking department that the action of these gentlemen was promoted by the laudable motive of averting any closing of the institution and they are in no way at fault for not having been able to consummate the program.

"If the new bank decides to function depositors of the old bank will be well to clearly understand that they will not get their money from the old bank until such time as the assets of the old bank are liquidated. This will necessarily take quite a period of time. The department at present is inclined to believe that if all that the depositors will eventually sustain no loss.

"In view of the high standing of some of the directorate and stockholders of the Studabaker Bank, it is reasonable to assume that they will make every effort to expedite liquidation in the interests of their friends who have money in the old bank. It is a time for wise counsel and prudent action. Bluffton is a good town, filled with good people, surrounded by a substantial farming district. There is no reason why the present regrettable difficulties should not be met with courage if those inconveniences will abstain from doing or saying anything which will interfere with constructive effort.

The other two banks in Bluffton are safe and sound and able to meet any reasonable demands. False a mis-leading statements, which would impair public confidence in worthy financial institutions, should be discouraged by all who have their own and their community's interest at heart.

"The department will issue further statements to the public as soon as it has information which it considers of interest and value."

BOYS ENROLL IN CORN CLUB

Sixteen Boys From Five Townships Already Entered In Contest

Sixteen boys from five townships of the county have enrolled in the one-acre corn club thus far, according to a count of the enrollment cards at the county agent's office. Thus far, no cards have been received from Union, Root, Washington, Blue Creek, French, Wabash or Jefferson townships. Since it is practically sure there are boys in these townships who plan to enter it is very likely the above number will be boosted. Those wanting to enter are urged to send in cards at once, as enrollment will close April 15.

According to the plans which will be used this year, boys may place their acres in any field on the farm making it unnecessary to have a separate plot for the corn. Also, they may use any variety of yellow corn they may care to, although in another year it is planned to have all contestants use the same corn. Some high grade seed corn is being tried out by several club boys this year, and, if it proves entirely satisfactory, they will be asked to furnish enough seed for the entire club next year.

Elevators of the county are financing the club this year. One hundred twenty dollars will be awarded winners, although the list of premiums has not been decided by the county corn club committee, which consists

of Wm. Patterson, Otto Hildebrand, Otis Shifferly and Otto Holle.

The four boys who placed highest in the club last year will receive free trips to the Purdue Club Roundup, to be held at Lafayette, May 3 to 4, inclusive, this year. The boys who will make the trip are, Richard Bryan, Ira Huser, Sylvan Habegger and Truman Holle. Several other club winners will make the trip at the same time, there being nine in all who will receive trips.
