The official thermometer here registered 94 degrees at 4 p. m., yesterday which is three degrees under the record established in 1913.

Temperatures Range From 92 To 98 In Midwest

Chicago, July 1—(UP)—Intense heat continued to grip the major portion of the middle west today bringing scores of deaths and acute suffering.

Temperatures ranged from 92 to 98 through the entire district. A United Press tabulation disclosed 87 deaths attributable either directly or indirectly to high temperatures in the past 36 hours. Five deaths occurred in Indiana.

Postpones His Flight Again Today

Barking Sands, Island of Kauai, July 1—(United Press)—The attempted trans-Pacific plane flight of Dick Grace, Pasadena, Calif., aviator was postponed until at least 2 p. m., today, standard time, according to an announcement made by Lieut. E. D. Kroger, Grace's flight manager. Weather conditions were reported improving, but Kroger said Grace must wait until the reports indicate the wind has dropped below 15 miles an hour.

Lindbergh Takes Off On Flight To Ottawa

St. Louis, July 1—(UP)—Col. Charles A. Lindbergh, hero of the first non-stop flight from New York to Paris, took off here today for Ottawa, Canada, where he will attend the Dominion Jubilee.

Lindbergh is flying the "Spirit of St. Louis", the Ryan monoplane in which he crossed the Atlantic. His trip to Canada may be made without a stop if weather conditions permit.

The Silver Gray plane left Lambert St. Louis flying field shortly before 9:30 a. m., today.

PRISON BOARD IS EXONERATED

Board Of Charities Votes Confidence In State Prison Officials

Michigan City, Ind., July 1—(UP)—The state board of charities has given the administration of the Michigan City prison a vote of confidence.

With measured emphasis, the board's report of its investigation of D. C. Stephenson's grave charges against Warden Walter H. Daly and President John Moorman of the trustees, is a sweeping exoneration.

The report, made public here today as the trustees met to consider Stephenson's application for a 90-day parole, dismisses the former Klan Dragon's reaction to his imprisonment as the inevitable result of a leader among men encountering, for the first time, severe discipline.

It finds that there is no truth to Stephenson's belief that there was discrimination against him.

It not only disclosed that Stephenson had refused to testify before the board about some of the charges that were made, but that he had withdrawn

others unconditionally, including the statement that his fall down a flight of stairs was the result of an attempt on his life.

It asserted that rather than having been denied privileges he had been given wide latitude in certain instances where prison officials rightly could have been severe.

Glen Hill Is Injured In Unusual Accident

Glen Hill of the West End restaurant met with a painful and unusual accident this morning while at work at his place of business. The transom from over the door fell and struck him on the head and arm. An artery near the right temple was severed and he bled profusely, receiving, also, an ugly gash on the arm. He was taken home and a physician summoned. He will be housed up for a day or so.
