HORSE SUBJECT OF GRAND JURY

Probe Governor's Alleged Sale Of Horse To D. C. Stephenson

Indianapolis, Ind., Sept. 2.—(INS)—The tale of the famous \$2,500 check which D. C. Stephenson gave to Governor Ed Jackson was believed to have been recalled to the Marion county grand jury investigating Indiana political corruption today by Floyd Christian, Noblesville attorney.

Christian, who was an attorney for D. C. Stephenson, during his trial at Noblesville for the murder of Miss Madge Oberholzer, was the first person who said he had seen the little slip of paper bearing Stephenson's signature, along with a number of other important political documents.

The revelation of the mass of political documents held by Stephenson was made to Christian in the cell of the former political dictator of Indiana at the Hamilton county jail just as the jury was about to bring in a verdict of guilty.

Governor Jackson, after remaining silent for six months concerning Christian's assertion that he had seen the check issued a statement that the check was authentic and was given to him by Stephenson in payment for a horse and equipment. The horse named "The Senator" subsequently died by choking on a corn cob, it was learned.

The anteroom of the grand jury today resembled a reunion of political corruption witnesses.

May Indict Five

Indianapolis, Ind., Sept. 2.—(UP)—A high state official will be named in an indictment to be returned by the Marion county grand jury next week.

It was reliably reported today as the investigating body entered the final phase of its work.

In addition, three other persons will be indicted by the grand jury and possibly four, according to present indications. The report may be made either Tuesday or Wednesday at the present rate of progress.

It was said at the office of Prosecutor William H. Remy that a way had been found to get around the statute of limitations. This was a stumbling block that threatened for a time to undo all the results obtained by Special Prosecutor John W. Holtzmann.
