Alleged Firebug Faces Habitual Criminal Charge

Indianapolis, Sept. 9.—(UP)—Maurice Delatour, who is alleged to have set fire to two Catholic churches in Indianapolis several weeks ago is charged with being a habitual criminal in an affidavit on file today at the county prosecutor's office.
If convicted, Delatour will be sentenced for life to the Indiana state prison at Michigan City. The affidavit probably will be filed today in criminal court. An arson charge also will be preferred.

The affidavit charges that Delatour was sentenced to prison terms in California, Georgia, and Florida and for burglary and arson, that he set fire to the St. Joan of Arc Catholic church here June 22, causing damage of \$600, and that he set fire to St. Patrick's Catholic church which was destroyed.

ANOTHER TON LITTER WEIGHED

Litter Of Nine Pigs Fed By Amos Kirchhofer Is Fifth Ton Litter

To Amos Kirchhofer, Wabash township farmer, is given the credit of producing the fifth ton litter to be weighed in Adams county this year. A weighing committee of neighbor farmers found that his litter of nine pure bred Durocs weighed 2,164 pounds when exactly 180 days of age. The largest pig in the litter weighed 297 1/2 pounds while the smallest weighed 197 pounds. The average weight was 240 pounds which is considerable above the average of ton litters.

The litter was fed along with two other litters farrowed on the farm this spring. Twenty-five pigs were all fed together by the self-feeder method. They received ground tankage, whole wheat and pig meal in the self-feeder during their early lives while the ration was limited to shelled corn and tankage during the last part of the feeding period. A very small amount of semi-solid butter-milk was fed.

Part of Mr. Kirchhofer's noteworthy accomplishment is due to the fact that he took it upon himself to raise two of the pigs by hand. As the sow farrowed 13 pigs he removed two of them immediately, leaving her to rear the remaining eleven. She saved only seven of them, however. He would have had no chance for a ton litter had he not gone to the extra work of hand-feeding the two pigs.

Eight Pigs Win Silver Medal

A weighing committee found that a litter of eight cross-bred Spotted Poland China-Durocs entered in the ton litter contest by Leonard F. Sprunger, farmer residing southeast of Berne weighed 1,915 pounds at 180 days of age, Wednesday. For this accomplishment Mr. Sprunger will be awarded a silver medal by the Indiana Livestock Breeders Association, which is sponsoring the ton litter work. That Mr. Sprunger is a consistently good hog feeder is attested to by the fact that he has won two gold medals in previous years. Ordinary farm feeds made up the bulk of the ration.

Indianapolis, Sept. 9.—(INS)—The notorious Hostetter Brothers, alleged to have taken part in the Southport bank robbery Feb. 18, 1926, were sentenced in Marion criminal court by Judge James A. Collins today.
