Damages Suit Filed

A suit in which judgment for \$5,000 damages is demanded, was filed in the Adams circuit court today by William B. Trout against Dr. Benjamin F. Beavers. The plaintiff alleges that in February, 1927, he called in the defendant to diagnose an illness from which he was suffering and to prescribe treatment for the same. He alleges that Dr. Beavers had him removed from his home to the Adams County Memorial Hospital where the latter continued to diagnose his condition. He states that the physician pronounced his case as constrictions of the bowels. The plaintiff states that he remained at the hospital for nine days and was then removed to his home. The next day, he states, he was taken back to the hospital and underwent an operation. It was learned in the operation, it is alleged, that the plaintiff was suffering from appendicitis. Mr. Trout alleges that he suffered intense pain and contracted a hospital bill through the carelessness and negligence of the defendant in diagnosing his condition and furnishing medical attention for him. Mr. Trout is his own attorney.
