Rev. John P. Durham, Of Marion, Gets Appointment In Fort Wayne Diocese

Fort Wayne, Sept. 29—Rev. John P. Durham, for the past 20 years pastor of St. Paul's Catholic church, Marion, has been appointed vicar-general of the diocese of Fort Wayne and judge in the matrimonial court, succeeding Mr. Rev. Msgr. John H. Oeschering, V. G., former pastor of St. Mary's church here, who has retired and is living in Germany.

Rev. Msgr. Joseph E. Oeschering, rector of St. Patrick's church, succeeded Msgr. Oeschering as moderator or dean of the Fort Wayne district. Rt. Rev. Msgr. John Oeschering, rector of St. Adalbert's church, South Bend, has been named dean of the South Bend district, succeeding in that office Rev. Francis Janzen, formerly pastor of St. Vincent's church, Elkhart, and recently transferred to St. Joseph's church, Hammond.

Rev. John M. Schmitz, rector of St. Charles' church, Peru, succeeds Msgr. Oeschering as examiner in domestic theology on the board of synodal examiners.

Father Durham, the new vicar-general, resides at St. Vincent's Orphan home in this city, where he will perform his duties of chaplain in addition to those of his diocesan office.

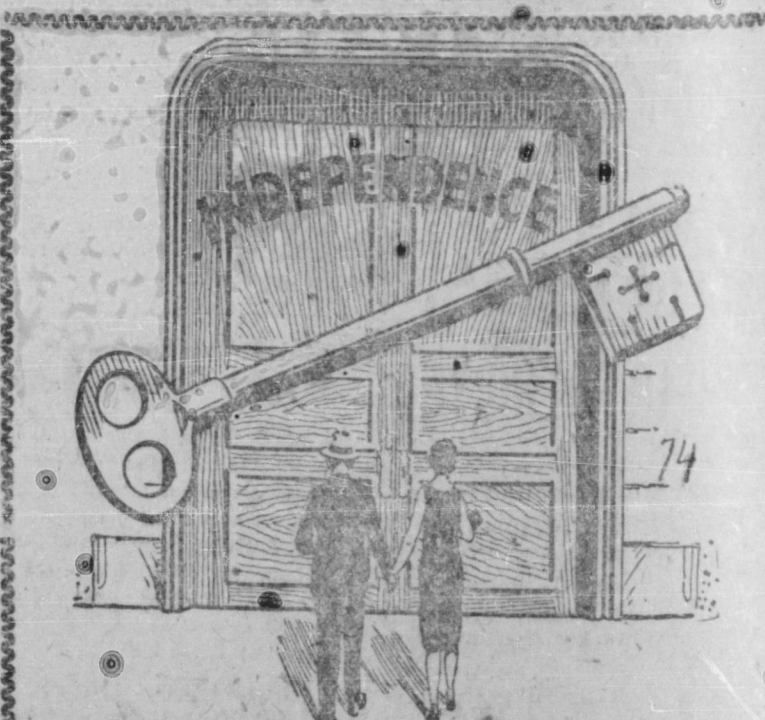
