REPORT MADE ON OIL PRODUCTION

Steady Progress Being Made In Oil And Gas Fields Of Indiana

Indianapolis, Ind., Sept. 30.—The monthly report of the geology division of the state conservation department on gas and oil inspection and production gives a summary of activities in the oil fields of nineteen counties and shows steady progress being made in Indiana at obtaining this natural resource.

Principal activity is reported in Davies, Gibson and Sullivan counties, where a number of new oil wells are being drilled and some of excellent flow were brought in.

Center Township continues to be the chief oil producing center of Gibson County, the report says. One 100 barrel well and a 150 barrel well were recently brought in on the L. Jenkins farm. Producting sand was encountered at 1392 feet.

In Veale Township, Davies County, Hartman and Sargent completed a well on the Otis Wildman farm which is producing 120 barrels per day. Top sand was at 1177 feet and a second pay was encountered at 1320 feet. This well is near the Gathers farm on which several good producing wells were previously brought in this summer.

The Sisco Oil Company is drilling six wells in the pool it developed in the northwest corner of Sullivan County and the southwestern part of Vigo County. Two of these are on the Joe Thomas farm where there already are two excellent producing wells.

In Posey County the Lincoln Refining Company has taken several leases and it is reported two test wells will be near New Harmony. Operators are drilled, one near Poseyville and one making several tests in Jay County just east of Hotmire Pool in Pike township, which three years ago was one of the best prospects in that territory.

PURDUE STATION PLANS FEATURES

Radio Station Overhauled; Formally Opened For Season Monday Night

Lafayette, Ind., Sept. 30.—Announcement of the October and November programs which will be broadcast from Purdue radio station, WBAA, beginning Monday night, Sept. 26, has been made, and reveals that a number of interesting talks, entertaining musical and stunt programs, football games and weather and market reports will be placed on the air from the university station.

The station equipment, overhauled and in many instances replaced during the summer, will operate this year on a wave length of 273 meters and power of 500 watts, and better reception generally over Indiana and the middle west is anticipated. At the formal opening Monday night, the Lowe-Jarvis orchestra, a campus organization, furnished a program of music before and after a short address by Prof. Albert A. Hansen, of the Purdue botany department, on "The Tragedy of Hindustan."

The talks and entertainment programs, in charge of fraternity men and campus organizations, will be a weekly feature each Monday and Friday evenings, beginning at 7 o'clock. Engineering, agricultural, and scientific talks of a popular nature will be featured.

In addition to the Monday and Friday programs, the home football games of Purdue, including DePauw, October 1; Montana State, October 29; Northwestern, Homecoming, Nov. 5 and Franklin on Nov. 12, will be broadcast, the station going on the air at 1:30 o'clock p. m. before each game, all of which start promptly at 2 o'clock.

Weather forecasts and reports of the Indianapolis livestock market will be broadcast daily at 9:50 o'clock a. m., beginning next Monday. This morning broadcast is of particular interest to residents of the agricultural districts.
