Bomb Wrecks Detroit Motion Picture Theatre

Detroit, Nov. 2.—(INS)—A tremendous bomb explosion early today shattered windows and shook buildings for blocks around, and partly buried under twisted wreckage a man who died shortly afterwards in Highland Park General hospital, and who is believed to have been one of the bombers. Damage was estimated at \$285,000.

A heavy blast shook the deserted streets of Highland Park. The roof of the Tivoli theatre hurled skyward in blazing pieces, the side walls split outward, cement blocks weighing 45 pounds hurtling through the air for nearly 200 feet, and a veritable rain of broken glass littered the pavement an sidewalks.

EXPLODING MOTOR KILLS 3; HURTS 5

Motor In Stalled Automobile Explodes, Killing Three Bystanders

Central City, Ky., Nov. 2.—(UP)—Three bystanders were killed and five other persons were injured here today when the engine in a stalled automobile exploded.

The dead are: P. C. Wells, 45, the father of five children; William Lewis, 16 and his brother Robert, 18.

The injured are: Jess Doss, 18, believed to be injured fatally; Mrs. E. D. Porter, injured about the legs; Carson Porter, 7, left arm blown off; two Porter children injured severely. The car in which the engine exploded was owned by Dr. E. D. Porter and driven by Mrs. Porter. The cause of the explosion has not been determined.

LOWER RAILWAY RATES POSSIBLE

Contemplated Corporation Tax Cut May Reduce Freight, Passenger Rates

Washington, Nov. 2.—(UP)—Possibility that a contemplated corporation tax reduction will permit reduction in railroad rates was discussed by the house ways and means committee today when Dr. C. S. Duncan, economist for the Association of Railway Executives, appealed for a 10 per cent corporation tax.
Duncan declared he could not promise reduction of freight or passenger rates but that reduction of the corporation tax from the present 13 1/2 per cent to 10 per cent would cut \$28,500,000 from the railroads annual tax bill. This reduction in cost of operation would be considered by the interstate commerce commission in fixing any new rates, he said.

Wabash, Ind., Nov. 2.—(INS)—Officers, directors and employees of the Citizens Savings and Trust company here have been absolved of all blame for closing of the institution, in a report of Thomas Barr, state bank examiner, in turning over the bank to Receiver James Showalter.
