ARMY OFFICER SPEAKS IN CITY

Capt. P. E. Greenwalt Tells Of His Experiences Dur- ing World War

Two outstanding services marked
the program of the Methodist Episco-
pal church of this city yesterday.

The morning service, conducted by
the pastor, the Rev. R. W. Stoakes,
was well attended as much had been
created by the announcement of the
series of sermons to be given by the
pastor on the theme, "Lost, Some-
where in an Agnostic World, God".

The first of these sermons was given
by the pastor in the morning service.

The evening meetings, given over to
an "Armistic" program, was so well
attended that it looked for a few min-
utes as if the spacious auditorium
would not hold the people. This was
the first of the church "Pleasant Sun-
day Evenings for Profit" and the pas-
tor states that the size of the audience
was gratifying indeed and that the pro-
gram disappointed no one. The first
part of the program was given over to
general singing, followed by a male
quartet. Mrs. Dan Tyndall sang "On
Flanders Field, to the tune of the Ros-
ary. This was very impressively sung
and in complete accord with the occa-
sion.

Captain P. E. Greenwalt, an officer
in the Rainbow division during the
world war, who had been invited as
the speaker of the evening, delivered
a touching and appealing address. He
told his personal experience under fire
as a chaplain. These experiences were
filled with close-ups of caring for the
wounded and dying in the front lines
where he served for so many months.

In relating these experiences, he was
determined to tell what his comrades
were either too modest or too timid to
tell. He said he wanted the world to
know the horrors of war and that the
object in telling of his personal ex-
periences was that "this same world
needs to be reminded 'Lest We For-
get'."

For more than an hour, the speaker
held his audience, here and there in-
jecting a bit of humor to relieve the
tense moments of vivid descriptions.

At the close of the address, the pas-
tor informed the audience that there
was a penalty for attending these
"Pleasant Sunday Evenings for profit",
and that was that every person
there was required to shake hands
with at least five people who were not
in their own crowd.
