The defense contended that since Judge James A. Collins disqualified himself on his own motion, the selection of Montgomery as special judge did not deprive it of the right to go into court and ask another change.

Johnson asserted Montgomery was chosen from a list of three in the manner prescribed for a change of judge and that the defense waived its right to ask a change on its motion. He said the state would fight to keep Montgomery on the bench in the case. It appeared that arguments would have to be heard.

General Sandino and his rebel troops keeping well hidden, the United States marine forces today were fortifying their present positions at Quilali and Nueva Segovia as reinforcements and supplies arrived.

No immediate battle is expected at El Chipote, the rebel mountain stronghold, it was indicated.

Several reports current regarding Sandino's power among the people and remarks concerning "heavy losses" by the marines made in Mexico City were definitely refuted by marine headquarters and persons familiar with the situation.

Alleged Thief Kills Self

Mishawaka, Ind., Jan. 6.—(INS)—Twenty-four hours after his arrest as an alleged member of an automobile theft ring, Sam Mercantini, 20, of this city, committed suicide by hurling himself in front of a speeding New York Central passenger train.

British Novelist Ill

London, Jan. 6.—(INS)—Thomas Hardy, British novelist, was described as "very ill" today in a bulletin issued by attending physicians at his home at Margate, Dorchester. Hardy has been ill for several days.

South Bend Lets Children Coast On Hillside Street

South Bend, Ind., Jan. 6.—(INS)—"It hurts to deprive our youngsters of some of the innocent pleasures we enjoyed when we were kids, but their lives are more important than a few minutes fun," said Police Chief James J. Hatt, in forbidding the children to hitch sleds to automobiles in this city.

To recompense the children the city set aside a street on a hillside for coasting and the fire department kept the slide icy.

Chicago Goes Gunning For Democratic Convention

Chicago, Jan. 6.—(UP)—An offer to pay all expenses of the Democratic national convention as an inducement to bring it to Chicago will be made to the Democratic national committee by a party of Chicagoans, headed by George E. Brennan, Illinois Democratic national committeeman.

The party will leave for Washington next week with a proffer of \$125,000 as a proof of readiness to do business.

Ice Jam In Mississippi River Grounds 30 Vessels

St. Louis, Mo., Jan. 6.—(UP)—A heavy ice jam in the Mississippi river which broke late yesterday and grounded 30 vessels below here, was locked again today, sending the river to the 20 foot mark and refloating the grounded craft.

The key jam, according to reports of J. R. Parker, wharfmaster here, was at Rush tower, 45 miles south, where the ice was packed to a depth of more than 15 feet. An island in mid-river was holding the floe.

New Clash Between Poland And Lithuania Reported

Berlin, Jan. 6.—(INS)—A new clash between Poland and Lithuania was reported today in dispatches from Warsaw.

A fifteen-minute fusillade between border guards on the Lithuanian-Polish border at Krazaczyna was reported. One Lithuanian was severely wounded.

Fears are entertained that this skirmish may lead to a revival of the troubles between these two countries, which were quelled at the recent League of Nations council meeting.
