

Pittsboro, Ind., Jan. 28—(UP)—The theory that the pioneer woman was more industrious than the housewife of today is refuted by Mrs. Margaret Walls, a farmer's wife living near Liz-  
ton.

At the same time Mrs. Walls proves that a college education is advantageous in the operation of a modern household. With the industry of a pioneer she accomplishes far more than would have been possible in early days because of her ingenuity in availing herself of scientific methods.

In addition to the usual duties of a farm woman Mrs. Walls manages two industries. She raises thoroughbred chickens which takes place each year at the county fair, and sells thousands of pounds of home-made candy yearly. An even thousand pounds was consumed by her Christmas trade alone, without any advertising other than that given by friends who knew the excellence of her product.
