## BABY FATALITY

### RATE LOWERED

#### Record In Indiana For 1927 Is 59 Deaths Per 1,000 Births

Indianapolis, Jan. 31.—(UP)—Indiana's 1927 baby crop was in excess of 217 tons, figures obtained from the state board of health today, indicate. More important, according to Dr. William F. King, director, is the fact that more than 205 of the total tonnage is still alive and kicking. The tonnage estimate was obtained by multiplying the number born by the average weight, seven pounds.

"While there were 62,551 babies born last year in the state, there were only 3662 fatalities recorded under one year of age," Dr. King said. "This record, 59 deaths per 1000 births is the lowest of any year in our files."

Contrary to popular opinion, summer heat proved to be the least fatal of all the seasons to the infants, July claiming the least number of victims, 256, while January led with 372. Deaths from diarrhoea, the bane of most parents existence, was reduced from 827 in 1926 to 561 in 1927.

The total deaths recorded in the state, last year, were 37,509. Heart disease was the cause most numerously given on the death reports, eaching the high figure of 5,517. Apoplexy was next resulting in 3,245 fatalities. Two persons succumbed to rabies during the year, and mycosis, a rare fungus skin disease, provided the cause for a single death.

Dr. King attributed the low mortality rate among infants to the educational work being done by the various organizations over the state in eaching proper care and feeding of infants, and supervising milk supply.
