

Radio "Doctor" Says  
Static Will Remain In  
Sets For Years To Come

Wabash, Ind., Feb. 1—(UP)—Static that infernal noise that can be gotten on any radio receiving set without effort, but which all efforts thus far, have been unable to eliminate, will remain in sets for many years, according to Garl Baber, one of the "doctors" on the static committee of the Radio Listeners Club.

"It will take a number of years to eliminate all the unwelcome noises in radio reception," he said. "Before we can do away with this interference, every electrical apparatus, light wire, and electric motor will have to be inspected."

The electric iron and curling iron, electric vibrating machines, bad connections in wiring, wires rubbing against trees and such were among the hundreds of things named by Baber that produce static.

"Doctors' x-ray and violet-ray machines and electric motors of all kinds, elevators, air compressors and many other necessary things are the villains that cause that dreaded crack on the radio just when the best part of the program is coming in," Baber declared.

Baber said that many of these static manufacturing plants could be done away with. For instance, new brushes or armatures could be put on electric machines, doctors could have their motors grounded at a small cost, and the electric wiring of each home could be checked for loose connections.

"Telephone wires do not cause static, but electric wires do. Loose connections between traction rails cause static. Of course, everyone knows lightning is natural broadcasting. Lightning is the worst kind of interference and probably never will be eliminated," the "doctor" concluded.
