U. S. Willing To Outlaw Use Of Submarine If Other Nations Agree

Washington, Feb. 4.—(UP)—Secretary of state Kellogg informed the house foreign relations committee today that the United States is willing to sign a treaty with other countries prohibiting the use of submarines.

In a letter, Kellogg approved a resolution of Rep. Forthingham Rep. M. declaring for outlawing the submarine, which the committee is considering.

Bomb Wrecks Home Of Campbell, Ohio, Mayor

Youngstown, Ohio, Feb. 4.—(INS)—Mayor T. Roy Gordon, of Campbell was slightly injured when a bomb explosion wrecked his home in Campbell today. Property damage was estimated at \$1,500.

Two suspects were arrested shortly after the explosion, one of whom confessed, according to police.

Germany's Killer Of Policemen Is Captured

Berlin, Feb. 4.—(INS)—The career killer of policemen, ended today. He was captured at Wuernttemberg by a posse of 5,000 police, soldiers and citizens.

Hein, nicknamed "the were-wolf", robbed a Thuringian post office and tied a man on a bicycle across Germany. In six days he covered 500 miles.

During his flight, Hein killed every policeman that approached him. He had killed three when captured.

The "were-wolf's" capture ended the greatest man-hunt in Germany since the war.

KLAN DELIVERS COUNTER BLOW

Attorneys For Secret Order File Demurrer To Gilliom's Charges

Indianapolis, Ind. Feb. 4.—(INS)—The Ku Klux Klan today was staking a counter offensive against attorney general Arthur L. Gilliom, who several weeks ago filed a suit to oust the secret order from Indiana.

Klan attorneys have filed a demurrer to Gilliom's charges, which were lodged in Marion county circuit court.

Sweeping denials of allegations of Gilliom were the chief feature of the Klan reply, which was prepared by Charles J. and Telford B. Orblison, of Indianapolis, and W. F. Zumburn and J. H. Connaughton, of Washington, D. C.

Replying to Gilliom's assault upon Klan membership, the demurrer said "It is not the law anywhere that because an organization is limited to a particular class of people, therefore such an organization could not be conducted along patriotic lines."

Among the other contentions in the Klan's reply were:

That the fact that the Klan pays its officers salaries is not proof that the organization is operated solely for the profit of its officials as alleged by Gilliom.
